

Pastor's Ponderings From Christmas to Ordinary Time

With the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, the Christmas Season liturgically comes to an end and we will be back in Ordinary Time until Lent. This year we actually have the longest Christmas season possible, with three Sundays and a total of 20 days.

Next to Christmas, however, Epiphany is a Solemnity filled with meaning that later was distributed to this Sunday and next Sunday as well. Epiphany originally connected to three major themes of the Season: the visit of the Magi, the baptism of Jesus and the miracle at the marriage in Cana.

One of the connections in Church tradition is Epiphany water. This is special holy water related to baptism. It is blessed at the Vigil or on Epiphany with a special liturgy, which takes about 45 minutes. During the liturgy, a small portion of salt and large amounts of water are both exorcised, blessed and then mixed with an additional blessing. Some believe Epiphany water does, in fact, have more potency.

Last weekend, Fr. Ed Wills, Administrator of Our Lady of Hope Ordinariate Community and Dn. Scott held that liturgy while we celebrated our 8am Mass. Our Holy Water container is now filled with Epiphany water. Please feel free to take a small sample with you if you use holy water in your home.

Another tradition we incorporated last week was Epiphany chalk. In a Vatican document on personal piety, we read: the blessing of homes, on whose lintels are inscribed the Cross of salvation, together with the indication of the year and the initials of the three wise men, [Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar] (C+M+B), which can also be interpreted to mean Christus mansionem benedicat, ["May Christ Bless this House"] written in blessed chalk...

In the Eastern Orthodox Church and in some Latin Rite churches, Epiphany water is used throughout the year in the baptismal font because of the connection with our Lord's baptism.

States. That means that almost ½ of all children conceived since 1973 have been aborted. It is hard to get one's head around that number, especially when each one represents a human life. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that Human life must be respected and protected absolutely from the moment of conception... From the first moment of his existence, a human being must be recognized as having the rights of a person - among which is the inviolable right of every innocent being to life.

This time of year, I can't help thinking about my 17 years in Northern Virginia and my annual participation in the March. When I was an Anglican archbishop, I even had the honor of addressing the gathered marchers from the platform.

Each year the March was a different experience, sometimes we had frigid temperatures or heavy snow, other years it was cold and rainy. The one thing that is consistent were the large number of marchers. Depending on the date, weather and other factors, attendance at the March would range anywhere from 300,000 to 650,000 people.

While most of us won't be able to join the March in Washington, I would invite you to pray with them on Friday. Let us pray that the message of life will continue to burn strongly in all those who stand for life, especially among our young men and women.
