Upon his return, he wrote it in a verse form and asked the church organist to install it to music before asking that the children's choir sing it for Christmas. It remained a children's classic for decades, reminding us all of Jesus' birthplace and the hope his arrival brought to the world. 9 Good Christian Men, Rejoice dominican Friars One of the lesser-known Christmas anthems, this song dates back to the Middle Ages - 1328, to be precise - and is believed to have been a folk melody. The first version is credited to German mystique Heinrich Seuss, who claimed to have heard angels sing the lyrics before he put it on song. 10 It came north clearly Frank Sinatra This spiritual hymn became a Christmas classic, despite the fact that it did not speak of God or even Jesus at all. Instead, he talks about singing angels playing near the ground to touch their harp gold and wishes peace on earth, goodwill to the people. Nevertheless, his message of positivity and content has become synonymous with Christmas when we all wish the greatest gift to come in the new year: peace. 11 While the shepherds were watching their flocks of John Foster The sixth poet laureate Nahum Tate in the 1700s and later set to music, this classic anthem was based on Luca 2: 8-14. It refers to shepherds who - literally - looked at their flocks of sheep the night Jesus was born, how the angel of the Lord came down and glory turned around. Soon a crowd of angels gathered, all praising God and celebrating the newfound peace on Earth that little baby Jesus discovered in. 12 God, rest you merry gentlemen of Pentatonix Also known as Cleaning Comfort and Joy, this melody is particularly traditional in England, where carol hails from (probably around the 16th century). But leave it to pentatonix's capella group to give it a fresh spin. The angels we heard at the height of the worship of exaltation, originally written in 1862, the Angels we heard on high, are a hymn based on the birth of Jesus Christ depicted in the Gospel of Luke. Even though many Christian artists have delivered their own rendition of the track, Charlotte, North Carolina worship group Elevation Worship version puts the updated spin on the time track. 15 Do you hear what I hear? Carrie Underwood Do you hear what I hear? is a relatively new tune as far as Christmas songs go. Then married couple Noel Regney and Gloria Shane Baker wrote it in 1962. 16 You hear what I hear?, Home Free Home Free's take on this tune makes it look like a completely different song. And you never know it from the achapel group's performance, but the original writers of Do You Hear What I Hear? wrote her about her fears of a nuclear missile during the Cold War. The smooth voice of Nath King Cole makes this song about the birthplace of Jesus Christ, which you'll want to listen to on a replay this holiday season. 18 He Shall Reign Forevermore by Chris Tomlin This modern Christian song is the first track on Chris Tomlin's second Christmas album (called Adore), which is full of praise and worship songs just like this one. 21' Hark! The Herald Angels Sing' by Celtic Woman This all-female musical ensemble merges a traditional Irish song with contemporary notes in an attempt to celebrate Ireland's colourful history. Get into the Christmas spirit with their rendition of this anniversary, which welcomes Jesus into life. 22 Christmas Proposal by Mark Hall Casting Crown Mark Hall of Christian rock band Casting Crowns offers songs of praise for Prince of Peace in this contemporary hit. 23 First Noel King's College Choir of Cambridge As one of the most famous choral tradition collectives of all time, the Royal College Choir of Cambridge leaves its listeners in awe year after year with their live Christmas performance like The First Noel. 24 The First Noel by Carrie Underwood Or if you want to listen to a more modern version of this classic, try Carrie Underwood's cover — released in 2007 as part of a special version of her album Carnival Ride. 25 Get out in the verbs of Susan Boyle Grab the tissues. Even though Susan Boyle brings the wow factor almost every time she sings, the British star's live performance of the talent anthem Get Out in the Yale is nothing short of magical. 26 We Three Kings by Kirk Franklin While the song is a classic, Kirk Franklin's renewed transfer of We Three Kings feels new. The song is based on biblical magi - also known as the Three Wise Men - from Matthew 2:11 and was written by John Henry Hopkins Jr. in 1857. 27 What a child Brad Paisley after he was struck down with a serious illness in 1865, insurance manager William Chatterton Dix had a spiritual revelation that caused him to write several hymns, including What a Child It Is. While this hymn is beautifully performed by church choirs around the world, many are fans of Brad Paisley's country undertones version. 28 The Joy of the World by Jeremy Riedle Worship leader, songwriter and pastor at Bethel Church, Jeremy Riddle, offers a contemporary living retelly of Joy of the World, an anthem that celebrates Jesus' coming to Earth. The lyrics to this song, which is based on psalm, were originally written by a minister named Isaac Watts. 29 O Come, Peter Hollensh's O Come Emmanuel Classically Trained vocalist Peter Hollenn beats every note in his recoil of O Come, O Come Emmanuel, a celebratory song that will surely remove you in the right spirit at Christmas. 30 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel' pentatonix Not a traditionalist? Try this more modern take of Pentatonix. While Apael's version sounds quite fashionable, the song is anything but new - the translation actually stems from an ancient 9th-century Latin anthem. 31 Ave Maria andrea Bocelli Ave Maria is the ultimate tribute to Mary from Nazareth, Mother of Jesus. What better vocalist to offer this musical form of praise than the world-famous Italian singer songwriter? 32 'Ave Maria' Michael Bublé We talked too early: Michael Bublé can compete with the best cover of this holiday song. The melody Ave Maria was written by Franz Schubert, but apparently the lyrics were added only when other artists were recorded with it (the way to Michael!). The name is actually Latin for Grad, Mary. 33 Mary, do you know Pentatonix Another award to Mary's mother, Mary Did you know you sound fresh and modern when performing a cappella. Thank you for sharing this song with the world, Pentatonix. 34 Adeste Fideles (O Come All Ye Faithful) Celine Dion Most people know this song as O Come All Ye Faithful, not Adeste Fideles, but the latter is the Latin name as it was originally written.
