Program Notes

The orchestra suites were originally known as "overtures." *The Overture No. 3 in D major* had five parts or "movements" called Overture, Air, Gavottes I/II, Bourrée and Gigue. The instrumentation was for trumpets I/II/III, timpani, oboe I/II, violin I/II, viola, and basso continuo.

The second movement of the suite, Air, became one of the most famous pieces of Baroque music when the German violinist August Wilhelmj (1845–1908) wrote an arrangement of it that could be played completely on the G-string. The Air has a beautiful lyrical melody that is supported by a masterfully composed bass part.

Today, there are many arrangements of the Air that are written for orchestras, string quartets, solo instruments and even in jazz style. You can explore YouTube and iTunes and listen to the various arrangements.

The first violin part in this arrangement could be played by solo violin or solo viola rather than by the entire first violin section.

About the Composer

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 –1750) stands unrivaled as the greatest composer of music during the Baroque period. He wrote sacred and secular music for choir, orchestra and solo instruments that was performed in churches and in the courts of royal patrons throughout the area of Europe known now as Germany.

When Bach was 32, he was hired as *Kapellmeister*, or Music Director, of the court of Prince Leopold of Anhalt-Köthen. Leopold became the Prince of Anhalt-Köthen at age 10. Prince Leopold studied music and when he was 23 years old, he hired Bach to be his court composer. Though the Prince lived only for another decade, his influence on Bach's music enabled Bach to write the *Brandenburg Concertos*, the *Well-Tempered Clavier*, the four Orchestral Suites, and the suites for solo violin and solo cello. Bach was paid very well for his work during his years at Anhalt-Köthen.

About the Arranger

Doris Gazda is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and Penn State University. She enjoyed many years as a string specialist in the Montgomery County, Maryland public schools, where she founded and conducted the Frederick County Youth Orchestra, and conducted the Potomac Valley Youth and Frederick Community Orchestras. Most recently, Ms. Gazda was on the faculty at Arizona State University. She has served nationally as Secretary for the American String Teachers Association, President of the National School Orchestra Association and Member-at-Large for the ASTA with NSOA.

A proponent of new music for student musicians, Ms. Gazda composes for strings and string orchestra. She is the author of *High Tech for Strings* (Carl Fischer), a set of technical studies for middle and high school orchestras, and co-author of the beginning method *Spotlight on Strings* (Neil A. Kjos). Nationally known for her leadership and expertise in string instruction, Ms Gazda presents workshops and conducts conference and regional student orchestras. She is a frequent presenter at state and national meetings for MENC (Music Educators National Conference), ASTA (American String Teachers Association) with NSOA (National School Orchestra Association), MTNA (Music Teachers National Association), regional school systems, and string workshops.
