Nimrod is the ninth variation from Elgar's Enigma Variations. Composed in honor of his friend, Augustus J. Jaeger, who supported his artistic efforts, this movement suggests the melancholy feeling of Beethoven's Piano Sonata No. 8, "Pathétique."

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

Directors will want to listen to the full orchestral version of "Nimrod" in order to get a sense of this highly rubato work that has been recorded over fifty times. Unlike the professional orchestral versions on YouTube, the director may find it beneficial to conduct the movement in a subdivided three. This will help students maintain a stronger sense of rhythmic security at this very slow tempo of J = 40. The dynamic changes, although very slight at times, must be observed to keep the attention of the audience focused at this slow tempo.

NOTE FROM THE EDITOR

In orchestral music, there are many editorial markings that are open for interpretation. In an effort to maintain consistency and clarity you may find some of these markings in this piece. In general, markings for fingerings, bowing patterns, and other items will only be marked with their initial appearance.
