NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

Effective contrast in dynamics, especially when the contrasts are sudden, will bring out the inherent suspense and mysteriousness in the music. Encourage students to be creative and write an adventure story to share about searching for a troll that follows their impressions of the path of the music!
