About the Composer

After graduating from high school in Nome, Alaska and from the University of Alaska, Anchorage with a degree in music education, Jonathan McBride went on to teach multiple levels of both band and choir in Alaska for 9 years. Jonathan currently teaches K-12 band, choir, and general music in the small town of Pateros, Washington.

In 2010 Jonathan earned his master's degree in instrumental conducting from the American Band College, and became a National Board Certified Teacher in Instrument Music. Jonathan is a consistent presenter at Washington's State Music Education Conference, and his bands have been featured performers at both Alaska and Washington State Conferences. In addition to teaching and composing, Jonathan also directs the Okanogan Valley Chorus, and in his rare free time he enjoys hiking, snowboarding, and playing video games.

Jonathan's compositions have been selected for editor's choice honors by JW Pepper, Stanton's Music, and can be found on Bandworld Magazine's Top 100 list. His works have been performed by honor bands and choirs in multiple states, and are often considered to be favorites by both students and audiences.

Rehearsal Suggestions

My suggestions for emphasizing musicality over technicality are as follows:

- · Play with style: Atlas Rising provides opportunities for the ensemble to play multiple styles and at varying dynamic levels. Playing indicated dynamics and articulations require practicing the technical "how," but also considering the musical "why." Take time explaining how dynamics and articulations are clues to the style; the feel of the piece. Playing in style will become easier as technical skills increase. Playing articulations and dynamics will become easier as understanding the musical style increases.
- Varying styles: The contrasting styles within this piece can be demanding for developing musicians. Louder sections require wind players to move air in a controlled way. Legato sections demand a different type of air control. To help develop both, first have the ensemble to play with full, smooth, and controlled air at mezzo volumes. Once quality tone is established, branching out to greater dynamic range and phrase length will be much easier. Allow the ensemble to experiment with dynamic extremes, but continue to use mezzo dynamics and medium phrase length as the benchmark for good tone. Encourage students to listen and always strive for the best possible sound.
- Maintain a steady tempo: The contrasting, more peaceful section in m. 26 is no slower than the surrounding sections. Encourage your students to play soft with good tone while also maintaining rhythmic intensity. Subdividing these sections will help illustrate how the beat remains
- · Pick-ups: A new theme enters one beat before m. 13. Although only flutes, horns, and bells enter on beat 4, take the time to practice the concept of "pick-up" with the full ensemble. Taking time to teach the "why" as well as the "how" to all students will lead to quicker understanding of similar examples in future pieces.

I hope you enjoy rehearsing and performing Atlas Rising.
