## Program Notes

**Down to the River**, also known as *Down in the River to Pray* and several other titles, is one of my all-time favorites. While its exact origins are unknown, or whether you consider it an African-American spiritual, an Appalachian song, or a southern gospel song, one thing about this piece of music is abundantly clear: it proves, emphatically, that a song doesn't have to be complex to get its message across to the listener.

## Rehearsal Suggestions

Probably the trickiest thing about this arrangement is the transition between the slow, hymn-like beginning and the up-tempo remainder of the tune. The key to this is the drummer playing four quarter notes in the correct rhythm during the fermata. If that happens, everything else should fall into place.

The beginning is designed to be played freely and reverently by the soloists. While it is jazz, and some liberties are inevitably going to be taken, be aware of keeping things in good taste so the reverent feel shines through. This will ultimately make the best contrast with the faster rock-like parts of the song.

Pay close attention to the articulation of the melody. It is notated to try to faithfully reproduce how a singer would articulate it, so the closer you get to that ideal, the better it will be received (and understood) by your audience.

It will be a challenge for the rhythm section to maintain the tempo and intensity of this piece at bars 24, 43, and 60, so always strive to push things along; but never rushing, of course. The notes that are written in the piano, bass, and drum parts are just there to give you a reference point, especially for younger players, but they will work just fine if performed at face value.

In regard to dynamics, the natural inclination is to always play a rock tune fast and loud. While the dynamics of this piece are subtle and not complex, strive to always make what difference you can between softer and louder passages. That always adds a special touch for any performance, for if everything is loud, it becomes much less listenable. Remember, when you see a *crescendo*, play softer on the front end, so you have somewhere to go.

I hope you enjoy performing this piece as much as I did writing it. Most importantly, though, have some fun with it!
