About this Series

A common concern among directors when beginning a jazz ensemble is that the wind players can handle the easier charts, but the rhythm section parts are still too difficult or vaguely written. Often, it is the rhythm section members who have little or no playing experience. There are also students who want to participate in the jazz band but do not play a traditional jazz instrument. This new series addresses these concerns and gives young ensembles a positive first experience.

About the Composer/Arranger



Victor López a former educator and administrator in the Miami-Dade County Public Schools System is a highly acclaimed composer, arranger, and adjudicator, and has achieved success in music performance, education, and administration. He holds music degrees from the University of Florida (U.F.) and Florida International University (F.I.U.), including a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) degree in Educational Administration and Supervision. For sixteen years he served as director of bands at Mays Junior High School and Miami Senior High School, and for nineteen years, he worked as an administrator in the Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS). He was the principal at G. W. Carver Middle School, which under his leadership received the National Blue Ribbon School of Excellence Award, and Miami Senior High School, his alma mater. Additionally, Victor has served as the Executive Director for the Division of Life Skills and Special Programs in M-DCPS, and has been an adjunct professor at Florida International University. Among many of his accomplishments, López was named the "1978 Miami-Dade County Public Schools Teacher of the Year" and the "1979 State of Florida Teacher of the Year." In addition to being the former lead trumpet player and arranger for the Miami Sound Machine, he has recorded and performed with various artists and has appeared in numerous music videos. Additionally, in 1999, López served his community as a councilman in the Doral Community Council in Doral, Florida. He has also participated in the Interstate New Teacher Assessment and Support Consortium (INTACS) committee, which drafted model arts education licensing standards and supporting materials for national certification. Furthermore, he was a founding board member of the Florida Schools Music Association, a non-profit organization that oversees all of the music activities in the State of Florida. As a clinician/conductor, adjudicator, and commission writer, Victor is in constant demand across the United States, Australia, Canada, and Latin America. He has over 450 publications with major music publishers such as Alfred, Barnhouse, Hal Leonard, Arrangers' Publishing Company and others to his credit and is currently a professor in the Educational/Organizational Leadership Department at Nova Southeastern University.

Program Note

Written by veteran composer Victor López, **Movin' N' Groovin'** is an original composition that blends elements of Latin and rock rhythms.

Rehearsal Suggestions

To achieve an effective performance, make certain that players in the rhythm section internalize the rhythmic components in order to maintain a smooth dance groove throughout. This is accomplished by rehearsing each part separately and then putting it together one instrument at a time. Note that the balance within the drum set as well as the entire rhythm section is important. The bass should be heard a bit louder but should not overpower the ensemble.

Starting at bar 26 the style changes to a Cha-Cha-Cha through bar 40. Pay attention to dynamics and articulations. As a suggestion, the syllable "Dit" should be used when playing staccatos; "Dah" for accented notes, and "Du" for long notes.

Review percussion technique for holding the claves, cowbell and tambourine. If needed, encourage students to search the internet as there is a wealth of informational videos available on YouTube that are presented by top professional musicians.

The auxiliary percussion part is optional in this series; however, it is an integral part for this chart. When doubling on other instruments, the player should place them within reach for quick accessibility. Make certain that all drums are properly tuned in order to produce clear and full tones. The drummer should search the internet to learn the drum tuning process.

Keep in mind that there are many variants of the Latin and rock rhythms. In this chart, you will find that the use of the "clave" pattern (3-2) defines the basic Latin beat. So, in general, there will be sections with mixed rhythms and others that are true to form such as bars 26-40.

Overall, I know that **Movin' N' Groovin'** will be well received by the audience and students.
