PROGRAM NOTES

I began composing this piece in 2017, when my choir professor Dr. Marie Bucoy-Calavan approached me with the poem. It resonated with her experience as a woman and person of color in America, and she thought it was something our community needed. Now, in a nation shaken by COVID-19, police brutality, and attacks on women's rights, I think Maya Angelou's work is ever more important. I have never experienced adversity to the level that the poem describes, but I think every human being can remember a time when they've felt worthless, downtrodden, and hated. Art can help us to understand these feelings, reflect upon them, and lift ourselves out of them. I hope this piece can do the same.

The opening counterpoint serves the same purpose as the overture to Mendelssohn's Elijah—to portray the passing of troubled times. The words "I'll rise" float overtop, as if someone is dreaming of a better future. We pass through various emotions, with compound meters representing the dream for a better tomorrow, and simple meters the troubled present. The climax comes when we switch tenses: from future "I'll rise" to present "I rise." I chose to end the piece with the same material as the troubled opening and the future tense, because I don't think we've arrived at an equal paradise yet. There is still so much work to be done.
