
#### Noteworthy Shepherds



# Glory to God

Glory to God in the highest! With these words from Luke 2, a heavenly host of angels announced the birth of Jesus to humble shepherds and inspired the eighteenth century carol from France titled, "Angels We Have Heard on High." No one knows who wrote the original hymn, but each stanza is filled with drama.

In Stanza 1, the shepherds begin telling their story. They heard angels sing so powerfully that the angels' voices echoed from the **mountains**. Stanza 2 asks the shepherds why they are so filled with excitement that they started singing! The shepherds respond in Stanza 3 with an invitation: Come to


Bethlehem and see! In Stanza 4, the shepherds invite everyone to

worship and adore the One whom choirs of angels praise.

In the refrain, the first syllable of *Gloria* has a long **melismatic** (many notes on a single syllable) passage in the melody, showing that the word is important.




## Carol Crossword












## "Angels We Have Heard on High" Harmony Map

## **Dramatic Reading**

Reader 1: Glory to God!

Readers 1 and 2: Glory to God in the highest!

Reader 1: With these words from Luke 2, a heavenly host of angels announced the birth of Jesus to humble shepherds.

Reader 2: The story of the angels and shepherds in Luke 2 inspired the carol, "Angels We Have Heard on High."

Reader 1: No one knows who wrote the original hymn, but each stanza is filled with poetic drama.

Reader 2: In Stanza 1, the shepherds begin telling their story. They heard angels sing so powerfully that the angels' voices echoed from the mountains.

Reader 1: Stanza 2 asks the shepherds why they are so filled with excitement that they started singing!

Reader 2: The shepherds respond in Stanza 3 with an invitation: Come to Bethlehem and see!

Reader 1: In Stanza 4, the shepherds invite everyone to worship and adore the One whom choirs of angels praise.

Reader 2: When we sing "Angels We Have Heard on High," we join the angels and shepherds as they praise God for giving the gift of Jesus Christ.

Reader 1: Gloria!

Readers 1 and 2: Gloria in excelsis Deo!

## Anonymous but Beloved

We don't know the author and composer names for "Fairest Lord Jesus." Since they are unknown, the author and composer of this hymn are anonymous.



The text first appeared in a German humn collection in 1677. We don't know who translated Stanzas 1-3.



Joseph Seiss, a Lutheran minister in America, translated Stanza 4 in 1873



The melody is a folk tune from a section of Europe known as Silesia. It first appeared in a song collection called Schlesische Volkslieder in 1842

Schlesische Volkslieder means "songs of the Silesian people." The melody, called the hymn



tune, has two names.



CRUSADERS' HYMN came from legends that Crusaders sang the hymn during medieval battles. This is probably not true, but the name is still used.



The tune name ST. ELIZABETH emerged when composer Franz Liszt used the tune in an oratorio titled "The Legend of St. Elizabeth."



This hymn reminds us that the wonders of nature are spectacular, but nothing is as beautiful and wondrous as Jesus!



"Fairest Lord Jesus" says Jesus is the Son of God and Son of Man. Jesus was fully human (like us) and fully God (not like us). God became human in the person of Jesus Christ. Bible scholars call this the Incarnation. Jesus became flesh and lived among us. He was 100 percent human and still 100 percent God. We cannot understand this mystery.

Jesus, though He was God, chose to humble Himself and become human. He was born as a helpless baby. He cried when He was hungry. He had to learn to crawl, walk, and talk just as other children. Unlike us, Jesus lived a perfect life and never sinned. Through His crucifixion and resurrection, Jesus enabled us to become children of God.

## "Fairest Lord Jesus" Hymn Interpretation


Pitches needed:

In this worship feature, any number of children can quickly create a musical underscore—a sound carpet (a texture of simultaneously performed musical patterns) as scriptures are read (see "Fairest Lord Jesus" Dramatic Reading) prior to the singing of each stanza by the congregation. The underscore uses the notes of the pentatonic scale. If desired, you may add finger cymbals, a triangle, bar chimes or mark tree, and an autoharp quietly strumming the Eb chord. Follow this sequence:

- 1. Keyboard(s) play the hymn introduction.
- 2. Children begin playing instruments quietly in random order to create the underscore. Children may be positioned throughout the worship space and move to their assigned places during the keyboard introduction.
- 3. After the underscore begins, have children read the first two scripture passages in the Dramatic Reading.
- 4. When the first two scripture readings are concluded, all instruments are dampened or silenced.
- 5. The congregation sings Stanza 1 with keyboard accompaniment.
- 6. At the conclusion of Stanza 1, the underscore begins again, and the next scripture passages are read, followed by the singing of the next stanza. This process continues until all scriptures have been read and all stanzas sung.

If desired, the pentatonic bells may play this descant as the hymn is sung.

## "FAIREST LORD JESUS" DRAMATIC READING

Reader 1: Christ ranks higher than all the things that have been made. Through his power all things were made—things in heaven and on earth, things seen and unseen, all powers, authorities, lords, and rulers. All things were made through Christ and for Christ. (Colossians 1:15-16)

Reader 2: You have not seen Christ, but still you love him. You cannot see him now, but you believe in him. You are filled with a joy that cannot be explained. And that joy is full of glory. (1 Peter 1:8)

Sing Stanza 1

Reader 1: Then God said, "Let the earth produce plants. Some plants will make grain for seeds. Others will make fruit with seeds in it. Every seed will produce more of its own kind of plant." And it happened. (Genesis 1:11)

Reader 2: So in all things Jesus is most important. God was pleased for all of himself to live in Christ. And through Christ, God decided to bring all things back to himself again—things on earth and things in heaven. (Colossians 1:18-20)

Sing Stanza 2

Reader 1: God made two large lights. He made the brighter light to rule the day. He made the smaller light to rule the night. He also made the stars. God put all these in the sky to shine on the earth. They are to rule over the day and over the night. He put them there to separate the light from the darkness. God saw that all these things were good. (Genesis 1:16-18)

Reader 2: God once said, "Let the light shine out of the darkness!" And this is the same God who made his light shine in our hearts. He gave us light by letting us know the glory of God that is in the face of Christ. (2 Corinthians 4:6)

Sing Stanza 3

Reader 1: God accepts anyone who worships him and does what is right. It is not important what country a person comes from. You know that God has sent his message to the people of Israel. That message is the Good News that peace has come through Jesus Christ. Jesus is the Lord of all people! (Acts 10:35-36)

Reader 2: For a short time he was made lower than the angels. But now we see him wearing a crown of glory and honor because he suffered and died. Because of God's grace, he died for everyone. (Hebrews 2:9)
