### **About the Composer**

Michael Hennagin was born in Oregon in 1936. His early interest in composition was nurtured by his piano teachers, and by the time he reached high school age he was well on his way to making composing a lifetime pursuit. Hennagin's formal training included studies with Leonard Stein in Los Angeles, Darius Milhaud at the Aspen Summer Music School, and the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. After his graduation in 1963, he went to the Berkshire Summer Music Festival at Tanglewood to study with Aaron Copland.

Hennagin returned to Los Angeles to pursue a career in film music, and composed scores for a number of television series, including a famous episode of *Voyage to the Bottom of the Sea* (*The Human Computer*) and several live television dramas. In 1965, Hennagin applied for and received a Ford Foundation Grant as Composer-in-Residence for the Detroit Public Schools. He had a long career in academia, working at the Kansas State Teachers College (later Emporia State University) and the University of Oklahoma School of Music. He served with distinction on the Faculty of the University of Oklahoma for nearly twenty years and was named Professor Emeritus of Music upon his retirement in 1991.

Hennagin's oeuvre comprises works for instrumental and vocal solo, chamber ensembles, and symphonic band and orchestra. By the time of his death in 1993, he had been recognized as one of the country's leading composers of choral music. He was the recipient of numerous commissions and awards, and made frequent appearances as guest artist, composer, lecturer, and conductor at concerts and workshops across the country.
