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#### PERFORMANCE SUGGESTIONS

This arrangement offers many options for performance, depending upon the resources that are available. The suggestions listed below are only a few of the possibilities.

Directors are encouraged to use their own creativity in assigning the various parts and in using the space that is available.

#### ASSIGNMENT OF CHORAL PARTS

- #1 CHOIR I = Children's Choir or adult sopranos (soloist or small ensemble)
  CHOIR II = SATB Choir
- #2 CHOIR I = Tenors and Basses CHOIR II = Sopranos and Altos sing the soprano part in unison
- #3 CHOIR I = Brass quartet (Choir I)
  CHOIR II = SATB or Unison Choir on soprano part

## INSTRUMENTAL ACCOMPANIMENT OPTIONS

- #1 Brass quartet (Choir 1) and organ
- #2 Brass quartet (Choir II) and organ
- #3 One trumpet plays Trumpet I part from either Brass Choir I or Brass Choir II
- #4 Two trumpets play Trumpet I part from Brass Choir I and Brass Choir II
- #5 Handbells play the organ accompaniment, either alone of with the organ doubling

### OTHER SUGGESTIONS

The Unison Choir part (Choir I) may be sung by soloist(s) or small ensembles placed antiphonally at different positions within the sanctuary or auditorium.

Sing in procession.

The work may also be performed by organ and two brass quartets, without the voices.
