parts, you may choose to reassign small portions of the dialog to additional

characters: Examples: Betty Berry, Timothy Tinsel, Nancy Noel.

STAGING SUGGESTIONS

This musical takes place in four Christmas Manor rooms [Foyer, Library, Living Room and Office]. These rooms are indicated by the changing of a sign on an easel in a location that is clearly visible to the audience.

SET

Christmas Manor can be as elaborate or as simple as your resources allow. You can have a backdrop behind the choir with a grand staircase and bookcase, a door frame for the opening entrance of the guests, chairs, a Christmas tree, holly and garland, etc. Or, you can simply have a few chairs, artificial plants and a small table top Christmas tree.

Although Dr. Christmas and the Guests simulate moving from one room to another, only one playing space is needed since the room changes are indicated by changing signage.

Place an easel on one side of the performance area. It is used to display large print signs that indicate the room in which the action is taking place. The signs are in the following sequence: Foyer, Library, Living Room, and Office.

PROPS

Foyer: Advent Wreath covered with a cloth

Library: Figure of an Angel

Living Room: Rubber Chicken and a Christmas tree topper star

Office: Large Manila Envelope with the address clearly printed on it (316 Hope Avenue).

SOUND EFFECTS

A door bell is used to announce the arrival of the guests. The doorbell sound effect is on the Listening Recording and Accompaniment Track.

When the rubber chicken is found and tossed aside, a clucking sound effect happens when the chicken is tossed. The clucking sound effect is on the Listening Recording and Accompaniment Track.

COSTUME SUGGESTIONS

Use the cover of this publication for costume ideas for each character. Specific ideas are as follows:

Dr. Christmas: A festive sport coat, necktie or ascot, and an optional Santa hat.

Carol Clueless: An outfit of mismatched colors, patterns, such as stripes/plaids together, etc.

Professor Plum Pudding: A large bowtie, large horn-rimmed glasses, etc.

Miss Holly Garland: Sunglasses*, a boa style scarf or fur wrap, optional head kerchief.**

Colonel Evergreen: A "scoutmaster" type official-looking uniform in khaki and/or green with a pith

helmet.

Candy Cane: Red and white striped or green and white striped clothing. Red bow in hair.

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The Christmas Manor doorbell rings and DR. CHRISTMAS welcomes his guests.

Dr. Christmas: Welcome everyone to my home, Christmas Manor!

CAROL CLUELESS, PROFESSOR PLUM PUDDING, MISS HOLLY GARLAND, COLONEL EVERGREEN, and CANDY CANE enter enthusiastically. As they enter, they ad lib happy Christmas greetings and comments such as "Merry Christmas!" "Great to see you!" "Thank you for the invite!" "It's wonderful being here!" etc.

Holly Garland: Hello Dahlings! Thank you for inviting us, Dr. Christmas!

Dr. Christmas: I love this time of year! Christmas is not only my last name, but the joy of Christmas is in my

heart.

Colonel Evergreen: Indeed, it is!

Dr. Christmas: You're probably wondering why I've asked you here to Christmas Manor. Well, each year, I

like to invite friends to my home to solve a mystery.

All Guests chatter with excitement: "What?" "A mystery?" "How fun!"

Dr. Christmas: Since you don't know each other, please introduce yourselves.

Professor Plum Pudding: Pip, pip and cheerio! I am Professor Plum Pudding. And I must admit I find mysteries a bit

sticky.

Holly Garland: Hello dahlings, I'm sure you recognize me, I'm the unforgettable Holly Garland! Star of stage

and screen!

Carol Clueless: Hi everyone! I must have taken a wrong turn at Albuquerque. I thought I was coming to a

cartoon convention. My name is Carol Clueless.

Candy Cane: I'm Candy Cane and I think it's sooooo sweet that we can spend this time together.

Colonel Evergreen: (formally and somewhat abrupt) Colonel Evergreen at your service! (salutes) If there's a

mystery to be solved or mountain to climb, I'm ready!

Candy Cane: Dr. Christmas, do tell us more about this mystery!

Dr. Christmas: By all means! I'm going to ask you all to solve The mystery of Christmas!

General chatter breaks out with the Guests saying things such as "Ooh!" "Oh, wow!" "That sounds interesting" "Tell us more!"

Professor Plum Pudding: (officiously) Hold on a moment. (the hubbub stops) Christmas isn't a mystery. We know

precisely what it's about.

Carol Clueless: It's presents and great food!

Holly Garland: (aloof and dramatic) As for myself dahlings, it's about fun songs and exquisite parties.

Professor Plum Pudding: All of that falderal may be well and good, but everyone knows that Christmas is about the birth

of Jesus.

Dr. Christmas: Of course, that's true, but why and how did Jesus leave Heaven and become human?

Candy Cane: Soooo, that's the mystery you want us to solve!

Dr. Christmas: Exactly! I've hidden clues throughout the manor. These clues will remind you of the

wonderful story of Christmas, and help you figure out the mystery.

Professor Plum Pudding: Smashing! Let's begin our search and determine...through precise calculations, the mystery of Christmas!

Holly Garland: Well, my dahlings, let's start right here.

General agreement from the guests: "Yes!" "There might be a clue right under our noses here" etc. They begin looking for clues. CAROL sees something downstage covered with a cloth.

Carol Clueless: (pointing at the covered object) What's this all covered up?

Colonel Evergreen: Let's find out! (dramatically pulls the cloth off revealing an Advent Wreath)

Candy Cane: It's an Advent Wreath! It represents the days that foretold the coming of Jesus. It must be

our very first clue.

WONDERFUL WONDER!

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Near the end of "Wonderful Wonder", DR. CHRISTMAS walks to the easel that indicates the room and changes the sign to reveal the word "Library". He points at the easel and gives a "thumbs up" and smiles at the audience.

Carol Clueless: Wow, what a beautiful library this is!

Holly Garland: (looking toward the audience) But I think we've just turned the page to a new chapter! Look

out the window, dahlings!! It's snowing!

The others look in the same direction.

Professor Plum Pudding: Not only is it snowing, it's a full-blown blizzard! We may be stranded if we don't leave immediately.

The guests appear anxious about being stranded at the manor and simultaneously make comments such as "Oh no, I can't believe it!" "Yes, we'd better leave soon" etc.

Colonel Evergreen: (firmly as if in command of a military platoon) Attention everyone! Solving this mystery is

important. We can't go now! (he pauses and looks up reverently) When duty calls, I never

leave my post.

Holly Garland: Colonel Evergreen is right. Courage, my dahlings. As you well know, the snow must,

(louder and with emphasis) I mean the show must go on!

Professor Plum Pudding: We should all remember that Mary and Joseph faced many challenges. This snowstorm is

nothing compared to their difficult journey to Bethlehem. And what about the fact that there

was no room at the inn?

While the others were talking, CAROL found an angel figure.

Carol Clueless: Look what I found! It's an angel figure. Is this our next clue?

Dr. Christmas: Of course it is. It's precisely what's needed to remind us that the angels were the ones who

announced the birth of Christ.

Candy Cane: And those angels announced His birth to a bunch of shepherds in the countryside outside of

Bethlehem. Being from Texas...the first thought that comes to mind is a rootin', tootin',

Near the end of "Heavenly Hallelujah Hoedown", DR. CHRISTMAS walks to the easel that indicates the room and changes the sign to reveal the word "Living Room." He points at the easel and gives a "thumbs up" and smiles at the audience.

Dr. Christmas: Welcome to the living room! The perfect place for a recap so far. Prophets foretold the coming

of Jesus...so it was no accident. Heavenly angels announced His birth to simple shepherds.

Professor Plum Pudding: Yes, yes, we know the glorious Christmas story.

Dr. Christmas: But you must keep looking for the clues and read between the lines!

Carol Clueless: Let's spread out and see what we can find.

Colonel Evergreen: There's something stuck under this chair. Can someone give me a hand?

Holly Garland: I might break a fingernail but here goes. (she reaches behind the chair) I think I've got

something!

Colonel Evergreen: Stand clear! I've got it.

Holly Garland: No! I have it!

HOLLY and the COLONEL both grab each end of a rubber chicken and hold it high in the air.

Professor Plum Pudding: Upon my initial analysis, it appears you have found a rubber chicken!

Carol Clueless: I know my last name is Clueless but (looking at DR. CHRISTMAS) what does a rubber

chicken have to do with Christmas?

Dr. Christmas: Oh, I'm sorry! (grabbing the chicken) That's Rupert, my pet chicken! How did he get in here?

Rupert...time for beddy bye.

He tosses RUPERT offstage – clucking sound effect.

Dr. Christmas: Everyone, keep looking!

CANDY CANE suddenly finds a Christmas tree topper star.

Candy Cane: What about this star? Could this be a clue?

Colonel Evergreen: It certainly would make sense. A bright star led the wise men to Jesus.

Dr. Christmas: Candy, you have found a very important clue. The kings who followed a bright star found

Jesus and worshipped Him.

Professor Plum Pudding: Yes, yes! Those kings were the bees knees! They were three wise guys!

Carol Clueless: Take a look out the window. It stopped snowing. Maybe we should go home before we all

go slip-sliding away.

Dr. Christmas: Why leave now? You're all welcome to stay overnight, and besides, you still haven't

solved the mystery of Christmas.

Professor Plum Pudding: Tally ho! Let's stick to the task and solve the mystery.

Candy Cane: I agree!

Everyone agrees and responds with comments such as: "I'm in", "Why not?" "Ok with me!" etc.

Holly Garland: Alright then, there's no turning back now. We can't give up. I believe God will bless our

efforts to solve this mystery!

Colonel Evergreen: (a very officious manner) Indeed! However, before we continue... I think we need to refine

our plan.

Candy Cane: How's this for a plan? Stop right where you are. Don't take one step. Look down and

carefully examine your immediate area.

Carol Clueless: I don't see anything except this big envelope. (holding it up - passes the evelope to

CANDY).

Candy Cane: Hang on Carol, I think you have found another clue!

Holly Garland: Good heavens dahlings, what on earth are you talking about?

Candy Cane: It's the address. The address on the envelope is 316 Hope Avenue.

Colonel Evergreen: The address of Christmas Manor!

Dr. Christmas: Congratulations Candy, you've found the sweet spot, but who knows what this clue might

mean?

Carol Clueless: The numbers three and sixteen are in the Bible. John 3:16 says "For God so loved the

world that He gave His only begotten Son...

Carol/Candy: ...that whosoever believeth in Him...

Carol/Candy/Professor: ...should not perish...

All Guests + Dr. Christmas: ...but have everlasting life!"

Dr. Christmas: The key to the mystery of Christmas are the first six words of this verse: "For God so loved

the world." The message is and has always been...

All: God's love!

CAROL shrugs and smiles while everyone smiles back at her as the closing song begins.
