
Seventh Chords

LESSON FOR LIFE

A **Seventh Chord** is a four-note chord with a root, 3rd, 5th, and 7th. Starting with a root position chord, a seventh chord can be built by adding a note that is a 7th above the root.


- ► The RH fingering for root position seventh chords is 1 2 3 5.
- ► The LH fingering for root position seventh chords is 5 3 2 1.






Major Seventh Chord

A **Major Seventh Chord** consists of a major triad (chord) with an added major seventh. A major seventh chord can be built by playing the first, third, fifth, and seventh notes of any major scale.






Helpful Hint: An easy way to find the 7th of a major seventh chord is to play the root of the major chord an octave higher and then move down a half step.

Minor Seventh Chord

A **Minor Seventh Chord** consists of a minor triad (chord) with an added minor seventh. A minor seventh chord can be built by playing the first, third, fifth, and seventh of any natural minor scale.







Helpful Hint: An easy way to find the 7th of a minor seventh chord is to play the root of the minor chord an octave higher and then move down a whole step.

Review: Dominant Seventh Chord


A dominant seventh chord consists of a major triad (chord) with an added minor seventh.







Helpful Hint: An easy way to find the 7th of a dominant seventh chord is to play the root of the major chord an octave higher and then move down a whole step.

5. Draw an interval of a minor 7th from the root of each minor chord to form a Minor Seventh chord.










Create a lead sheet arrangement of "Jazz Reflections" using these chords:

- 3. Play a block chord with the LH on beats 1 and 4 of each measure while playing the RH melody. In measures 11 and 12, where there is only one chord, repeat the chord on beat 4.
- 4. Create an arrangement with block chords that omits the 5th of each seventh chord throughout and omits the 5th of all chords in measures 9, 10, and 12. In measure 16, change the pattern for the ending.



Create a lead sheet arrangement of "Polovtsian Dance" using these chords:



- 1. Practice the chords with the left hand (LH).
- 2. Practice the melody with the right hand (RH).
- 3. Play a block chord in the LH on beat 1 of each measure while playing the RH melody. In measures 5 and 13, omit the 5th of the Gm chord.

- 4. Create an arrangement with block chords.
 - ▶ For measures with a three-note chord (mm. 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13), use this rhythm () and omit the 5th of each chord.
 - ▶ For measures that use a seventh chord (mm. 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14), use this rhythm (. . .) and omit the 5th of each chord.
 - ▶ In measures 15–16, change the pattern for the ending.
