About this work

"If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants."

"It takes a noble person to plant a seed for a tree that will someday give shade to a person they will never meet."

The title of the work comes from the extended metaphor, "Standing on the shoulders of giants," made famous by the physicist, astronomer, alchemist, and theologian Sir Isaac Newton in a 1675 letter. "Giants" – be they great innovators like Thomas Edison or Steve Jobs, or great leaders such as Indira Gandhi or Winston Churchill, or amazing teachers, parents, or coaches, did not come from a vacuum. They (and all of us) build from prior work, discoveries. technologies, and acts of kindness toward humanity. Even the most innovative ideas come from somewhere – from an experience, from some comment or prior discovery in that or another field. No matter how unique an idea, there are people whose "shoulders" the creator stood on to make it possible. The fact that we are all connected in some way does not make us less individually important. In fact, it means that we are part of a wonderful life chain and everything that we do matters to someone who is somewhere around us. Our life is significant even to those whom we will never meet.

The text below represents excerpts from two sources. One is from the poetry of Lanny, Steve, and Doug Cotler (first three stanzas) and the remainder is from Lord Byron (b. 1778) – a flamboyant and notorious English Romantic poet.

Years ago, they crossed the sea,

And made a life that's come to me.

I'm standing on the shoulders of the ones who came before.

So in the garden I'll plant a seed,
A tree of life for you to read.
The fruit will ripen in the sun.
The words will sound when I am gone.

In the garden there's a tree
Planted by someone who only imagined me.
What love! What vision!
I marvel at the gift.

Be the rainbow in the storms of life, The ev'ning beam that smiles the clouds away. And tints tomorrow with prophetic ray. Sorrows disappear, courage is reborn.

About the composer

Z. Randall Stroope is an American composer and conductor. His composition teachers were Normand Lockwood and Cecil Effinger, both students of Nadia Boulanger, the famous French teacher and student of Gabriel Fauré. Randall studied conducting with Margaret Hillis, chorusmaster of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. He is the artistic director of two international summer music festivals, and guest conducts about 25 concerts a year in the United States and Europe. 


