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La Llorona

Program Notes:

The legend of La Llorona tells a tragic and haunting story of loss and remorse, centering on a woman whose actions led to a lifetime of sorrow and an eternity of restless wandering. As a spirit, she was condemned to roam the riverbanks, forever searching for her lost children. Over time, various interpretations and additions have been made to the original tale, resulting in many different variations.

The origins of La Llorona are a mystery, but it's believed to have roots in the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, which includes parts of Veracruz and Oaxaca, Mexico. La Llorona is considered a Son Jarocho. "Son" means "Song" and "Jarocho" is a word commonly used to describe the area of Southern Veracruz. The Son Jarocho is a style of music characterized by the use of the Arpa Jaroche (a type of harp that is commonly used in mariachi music), and a Jarana (an eight stringed instrument with a distinct, percussive sound).

La Llorona is a popular song in the *Día De Los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) holiday celebrated across Latin America, where families and friends come together to honor their loved ones who have passed away. This celebration often involves family members creating a place in their homes to leave ofrendas, which are offerings of favorite food and beverages that were enjoyed by the departed. The ofrendas are often decorated with marigolds to honor their memory, guide their spirits back, and symbolize the fragility and beauty of life.

From the Composer:

Día De Los Muertos is a traditional holiday celebrated on November 1st and 2nd. Consider setting up your own ofrendas with marigolds around your classroom or stage. Additionally, several students can participate in the Catrina makeup tradition, where they paint their faces to resemble intricate skulls.

To enhance the performance, I recommend having a student play the optional guitar part to create a more authentic performance. Also, it is possible to have a student play the bass part on the *guitarrón* if you would like to incorporate more of a mariachi sound to your performance.
