

Note from the Composer

When Jennie Crawford asked me to write this song for her varsity middle-school boys' choir, she asked for something up-tempo, fun, catchy, and percussive, referencing Paul Reardon's *Sound Off*. I tried to incorporate challenging, yet accessible rhythms and harmonic progressions, with some fun choreography (boys love to move, so we played to their strengths!)

I recommend teaching this piece almost exclusively by rote. The concepts are repetitive and will make more sense if the kids focus on hearing and feeling, rather than reading. No need to inundate their brains with counting rests for syncopation and polyrhythms! If possible, keep each part separate from each other, and teach via call-and-response by section. Kinesthetic gestures will help with some of the syncopated accents. If they can feel it, they can do it!

When choreographing, I recommend assigning "choreography captains" for each section. Find boy(s) in each section who aren't short on coordination and congeniality and let them lead. The sections will rally, and your moves will be relevant. Of course, you'll want to make sure the notes and changes are solidified before adding movement. Note: it will become more difficult to tune with the increased adrenaline from dancing.

As a percussion section, we sort of "jammed out" for a bit before finding the groove that worked. For the premiere, we used cajón, cabasa, and a big upside down industrial rubber garbage can with drum sticks. Feel free to deviate from these exact instrumental rhythms, but be sure to use something with some boom; improvisation from the printed percussion rhythm is welcome. Remember, we jammed; then notated, so do your thing.

^{*} Ad lib percussion as an intro for two to four measures. Repeat mm. 1-4 four times: first time-bass, second time add T1, third time add T2, fourth time all. D.C.: only sing mm. 1-4 one time. Percussion patterns are for reference; feel free to improvise and/or add any additional instruments.
