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Program Notes

Serenata Notturna K. 239, is a carefree, yet majestic sounding work most likely written to be enjoyed at an evening party in Vienna. The concertino parts have been rescored to be played seamlessly by a traditional string orchestra. The optional timpani part adds even more power to the already vibrant string writing. This masterpiece by Mozart will require some third position for first violin and bass and some second position for cello. It's a great piece to refine the brush stroke and light classical playing.

About the Composer

Todd Parrish has taught public school orchestras at all levels for 17 years in both Illinois and Virginia. He currently has several original compositions and arrangements published with Alfred Music and Wingert-Jones Publications. He received a Bachelor of Music Education degree at Oral Roberts University in Oklahoma and a Master of Music in orchestral conducting from the University of Arizona. He has studied conducting at workshops with many leading teachers in Colorado, Illinois, South Carolina, Maine, and Aix-en-Provence, France. Todd is the orchestra editor for J.W. Pepper & Son sheet music and the string editor for Wingert-Jones Publications based in Exton, Pennsylvania.
