Clyde Warrior Civil **Rights Recognition**

On October 18, 2024, the Native Professional Advancement Center hosted the Clyde Warrior Civil Rights Recognition event to celebrate the Red Power roots that run deep from the organization's parent company, the National Indian Youth Council (NIYC). Clyde Warrior was an icon of the Red Power Movement in the 1960's that fought to recognize the human and civil rights of American Indians. Organized in partnership with the American Indians for Opportunity (AIO) and the Native Leadership Collective, the event recognize community leaders and organizations who have worked to promote the civil rights of Native Americans.


KEY INSIGHTS:

PROGRAM PERFORAMNCE

The following data describes WIOA program performance from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024.


NUMBER OF NEW MEXICANS SERVED

NPAC served a total of 388 individuals during the program year. Of the total, 120 were new enrollments, 114 exited, and 154 carry-over into the next program year.



PROGRAM PARTICIAPTION

The majority of participants are enrolled in Classroom Training. Of 388 people served, 255 or 65.7 % are enrolled in Classroom Training and 133 or 34.3% are enrolled in Work Experience.



CREDENTIAL RATE 41.4%

Of the 255 students enrolled in Classroom Training Program, 53 completed a credential or degree in PY 2023.



PROGRAM FUNDS DISTRIBUTED

A total of 365 paychecks were issued to the WEX program representing nearly \$250k wages.





A total of 1,407 stipend checks were distributed in PY 2023 representing nearly \$300k in funds to Classroom Training students.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

Supportive Services are short-term financial assistance provided to both Classroom Training and Work Experience participants to help with transportation, housing, childcare, and educational or licensing fees. NPAC provided \$25k in services to participants.
