Program Highlights

- Three year (9 semesters) full-time program; 92 credits
- Courses are in a hybrid format which includes online learning, face-to-face coursework, extensive laboratory and clinical practicums, and direct patient experiences
- Duquesne School of Nursing - 54 credits
- Duquesne Rangos School of Health Sciences - 15 credits
- Allegheny School of Anesthesia - 23 credits

- Small class size, 25 students maximum per cohort
- Graduates are eligible for certification by the National Board of Certification and Recertification for Nurse Anesthetists (NBCRNA)

Admission Requirements

To qualify for the DNAP program, you must:

- Hold a current, unencumbered RN license in the United States, its territories or protectorates
- Hold a baccalaureate degree (BSN or BS) from an accredited college or university with a 3.2 GPA or higher
- Have a minimum of 2 years of nursing experience in an adult critical care setting
- Have current BCLS, ACLS, and PALS certifications completed by the start of the program
- Have completed the following undergraduate course work within the last 10 years (5 years preferred) with a grade of "B" or higher:
 - Human Anatomy and Physiology I and II with labs
 - Chemistry with lab
 - Pharmacology
 - Statistics
 - Research/Evidence-Based Practice
