Sergio Aguayo is a political scientist and one of Mexico's leading public intellectuals, author of numerous books and articles. He writes a weekly column for the Mexico City newspaper *Reforma* which appears in 17 other publications, including the Chicago edition of *Hoy*. Aguayo has taught at the Colegio de Mexico since 1977 and has been a visiting professor at the University of Chicago, the University of California-Berkeley, and the New School. Over the past three decades, he has played a leading role in the founding of important civil society organizations including the *Academia Mexicana de Derechos Humanos*, one of Mexico's first human rights organizations, and the *Alianza Cívica* which played a critical role in securing electoral reforms in the 1990s. Aguayo most recently helped found *Fundar: Centro de Análisis e Investigación* which received the 2006 MacArthur Foundation award for Creative and Effective Institutions.
