




Are you currently in self-quarantine or confined to your home?

How serious is covid-19 and when will it end?

When people answered the survey in March just 28% were in quarantine. That was before the first wave had taken hold, and the second or third waves had hit. As of December, when new lockdowns were ordered, 44% were in isolation when they answered the survey.






How serious do you think the Coronavirus (nCov-19) threat is?




When asked to rate the seriousness of coronavirus on a scale of 0 to 5 at the beginning of the pandemic around 60% rated it 4 or 5 (very serious, extremely serious). As the virus spread and the impact of what was before us hit home that jumped to 85%. Despite a spiraling death toll and doubt about the efficacy of a vaccine in December that dropped back to 60%. Are we learning to live with covid-19?




Do you think that the threat globally is contained and the threat will soon be over?

Confidence that the threat is contained was originally high, but took a battering in April. Overall though people are optimistic, 58% believe we have it under control.








Despite vaccine optimism do you think the situation is getting better or worse?



Which is also reflected with 65% believing the situation is getting better - even though deaths in the USA topped 30,000 in December and the UK went back into a hard lockdown to control the spread.




How much longer do you think it will be necessary to have mandated precautions to stop the spread of Covid-19?

30% of respondents believed it will be in the second half of 2021 before mandatory precautions are lifted. Significantly more than half as many believed it will be 2022 before the masks come off.




Have you changed your behaviour in any of these ways in response to the Coronavirus (nCov-19)? Please tick any

When it comes to personal precautions we have learned since the beginning of the pandemic that face masks are essential, shaking hands is definitely a no-no, and taxis and ride-sharing might be a risk.




Have stores in your local area sold out of any of the following? Please tick all that apply.

Hand sanitizer and PPE is still hard to come by, but easier than back in March. Although toiletries, medicines, and head thermometers are more troublesome to locate now.




Are there long queues (30min+ wait times) at your local supermarket?

Queues at supermarkets, pharmacies and hospitals don't seem to be going away.




Are there long queues (30min+ wait times) at your local pharmacist?

Is there a long wait time (2 hours+) to access your local hospital?


Queues at supermarkets, pharmacies and hospitals don't seem to be going away.

Just over half think one country is responsible.






If the FDA (or your local health authority) said it had a vaccine that was effective, totally safe, painless, and freely available at no cost would you take it?

Do you find claims that a vaccine is over 90% effective credible?






And believe it will be effective for months or even years.


I'm not getting it until enough people have taken it and I think it's safe

So where does that leave us with competing vaccines - 30% had no preference and would accept any vaccine. 20% preferred the Pfizer/ BioNtech vaccine.


However there are 22% who will not take any vaccine...


...citing side effects, lack of research or a combination of those reasons for refusing it.



Is your business experiencing any impact?

When asked about the impact of covid-19 on their business there's a familiar story. Perhaps it was optimism, or disbelief in March, but most businesses had felt no impact, and significantly, many expect no impact in future.


It was a different story as the crisis deepened and the world's freelancers and the companies which employ them suffered a downturn.

10 months later and some optimism has returned. The number of businesses reporting significant impact has fallen, Those rating the impact as minor or moderate have risen, and the green bar, businesses who survived with no impact are expecting it to stay that way in the future.




Are you having trouble getting products from your suppliers?

In the middle of the pandemic as many as 75% of businesses said they were having trouble getting products from suppliers. It remains a problem for more than half of businesses at the end of 2020.



Please tick the boxes that apply in respect to issues in getting products from your suppliers


The main reason, the price of goods has skyrocketed, stocks are in short supply and lead times for delivery have grown.



More generally, how seriously on a scale of 0 to 5 do you think the Covid-19 will affect the global supply chain?


0=no impact, 5= extremely serious

What impact is Covid-19 having on your business?


In this chart we see the impact covid-19 has had on regular jobs. Only 16% of businesses said it was BAU. 1 in 5 cancelled or suspended some operations but kept going. 13% simply shut down. 9% reduced staffing levels. 5% kept on all staff but reduced their hours (and wages).


With money tight, but with jobs still to be done 64% of businesses said they'd hire freelancers rather than full-time staff.



Histogram based on December 2020 survey responses


And here's why, very few could survive on their savings for longer than 6 months.




Maybe it's because of all the stimulus bonuses, financial support programs and recovery packages being splashed about. People seem to like it, and want more.


What goes up, and up, and up, must come down, or so say 67% of respondents.


That fear has not translated into a flight away from vulnerable currency into safer commodities. The preference for gold has risen just 5% since mid-2020, and Bitcoin 6%.




Do you think Covid has been beneficial for the environment?


Do you think a "Great Reset" is needed?






What percentage of your workforce is back at work?



Will you let your staff work from home more as a result of Covid-19?


Of those respondents who have staff, 49% said they would continue to allow staff to work from home in future. That rises to 82% of businesses when including workplaces that already allow work-from-home.

We asked our users what they thought work would look like in the future. Nearly 30% thought we'd be back to the 9-to-5 commute when the pandemic is over. Slightly more thought there'd be more time at home and "hubs" for collaboration. A smaller proportion (13%) have declared the office is dead.






Do you think the US election was rigged?


The survey was taken after the US election, but before the inauguration, and also before the Capitol riot, but maybe we should have seen it coming with 34% of people sure the election was rigged!

But interestingly half that number thought Trump was the true winner. Make of that what you will!






Do you think that your local area is well informed about the Coronavirus (nCov-19)?


There's hardly been anything else in the news throughout 2020, so 75% people feel they have been well informed all year.


Trust in health officials, government and online media has remained strong throughout the crisis, but by the time we got to December it seems we no longer believe traditional media and social media.


55% of respondents are satisfied with the way their government has handled the crisis. The 44% dissatisfied look certain to use their vote to make their displeasure known.




Almost 70% of respondents believe curbing covid-19 meant their civil liberties were curtailed, but half of them said it was "necessary".

And will those rights be returned? 55% think they're gone forever and will never be returned to us.




Do you think that "Big Tech" have manipulated the information and news disseminated on their platforms during Covid?

77% agreed with the proposition that big tech platforms are more than distributors of content, they are publishers and should be held to the same standard. Which includes paying media publishers for using their content.




Do you think that "Big Tech" should be reclassified as publishers and be legally liable for what is disseminated on their platforms?

77% agreed with the proposition that big tech platforms are more than distributors of content, they are publishers and should be held to the same standard. Which includes paying media publishers for using their content.




Do you think "Big Tech" should pay news publishers for content?


77% agreed with the proposition that big tech platforms are more than distributors of content, they are publishers and should be held to the same standard. Which includes paying media publishers for using their content.

Not surprisingly given what we've all seen happen over the last 10 months, the proportion of people who think covid-19 is fake has plummeted from over 55% to under 15%.






Do you think there should be a "vaccine passport" in order to travel?



Top 20 countries listed below, other countries are in the map




And there's no support for packing up and moving permanently because of covid-19. 75% said they're going to stick it out where they are.


Cruise ships are still on the nose, but not as bad as they were at the beginning of the pandemic.






Beijing's Winter Olympics fare a little better but will still be shunned by 54% of people.








What country are you located in?


What industries are you in?
