Public Lecture: Monday, September 15, 2003

On Monday, September 15, 2003, the Santa Fe Art Institute will offer "Picturing Water," a slide lecture by artist Stacy Levy, who will discuss her work with water, including her investigations of aquatic life, her pieces about rain and storm waters, and her tide works. Following the lecture, there will be a question-and-answer session. The lecture is open to the public and will take place at 6 p.m. in Tipton Hall on the College of Santa Fe campus.

Stacy Levy's artwork involves water by investigating aquatic life, clarifying the movement of rain and storm water in the landscape, and making visible the patterns of watersheds. She has had public commissions in Seattle and Philadelphia for work detailing microscopic life forms, and in Philadelphia for projects about rain and storm waters. Levy is currently creating tide works in New York on the Hudson River with Sasaki Associates, and in Philadelphia on the Schuylkill River with Winifred Lutz and the Delta Group. She recently completed the second phase of *Testing the Waters, the National Demonstration Project for Acid Mine Drainage and Art*, with Julie Bargmann, T. Allan Comp, and Bob Deason in Vintondale, Pennsylvania. *Testing the Waters* was shown at *Documenta* in 2002. Levy also works with mold and algae and has created micro-floral designs with the Fabric Workshop and Museum in Philadelphia and the Kohler Art Center in Sheboygan, Wisconsin. She is represented by Larry Becker Contemporary Art in Philadelphia.
