**Joel Glanzberg, "Reading Patterns in the Landscape"**  
**Public Lecture: Monday, June 2, 2003**  
**Workshop: June 2 – 6, 2003**

On Monday, June 2, 2003, Joel Glanzberg will present "Reading Patterns in the Landscape," a lecture that will address patterns of water flow, geology, weather, and human movement in the landscape and what these patterns signify. The lecture is open to the public and will take place at 6 p.m. in Tipton Hall on the College of Santa Fe campus. "Reading Patterns in the Landscape" is part of the Santa Fe Art Institute's Uncommon Ground: Manmade series.

Glanzberg's five-day workshop (June 2 – 6) will be an interactive exploration taking the Santa Fe Art Institute's facility as its example. The workshop will examine location in the landscape and in relation to physical plant and general traffic flow as well as the impact on the watershed and geology.

Joel Glanzberg has broad experience in design and management of green building and ecological restoration projects, particularly in the Southwest and Latin America. Currently, he is a consultant to the City of Santa Fe on the issue of watershed restoration. He is a partner in the Santa Fe River Community Project with artists Helen and Newton Harrison, and he is working with youth groups to reintroduce genetic diversity to the watershed ecology. An author and educator in the fields of permaculture and ecological restoration, Glanzberg is skilled in cross-cultural communication and teaching.

Lecture tickets are \$5 and are available at the door on the night of the event. Workshop fees are \$500 per week. Sliding scale fees are available. During workshops, residency space may be available for participants at the Santa Fe Art Institute's facility, a spectacular 17,000 square-foot complex designed by Mexican architect Ricardo Legoretta.

The lecture and workshop are elements of the Santa Fe Art Institute's 2003 Uncommon Ground: Manmade series.
