- ■People Pleasers
- **■**Conflict Avoidance
- ■Difficulty saying no

Cause: The Abusive Relationship

- Abusive relationships are governed by fear.
- Walking on eggshells
- ■Fear is an appropriate response to an abusive person.
- ■The abusive relationship becomes the paradigm for all her relationships.

Relationships Governed by Love

■Her relationship with God must become the new paradigm for her relationships.

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love."

¹³ By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. ¹⁴ And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world... 16 So we have come to know and to believe the love that God has for us...¹⁷ By this is love perfected with us, so that we may have confidence for the day of judgment, because as he is so also are we in this world. 18 There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us...²¹ And this

commandment we have from him: whoever loves

God must also love his brother.

Loving the Abuser

- ■Most abusive relationships will continue to be governed by fear until the survivor leaves, and/or the abuser begins to repent.
- Loving an abuser involves helping him realize that he is not the king.

*Boundaries

- A boundary sets a limit on an abuser's level of control, which helps create a relationship of mutuality.
 - ■Informing an abuser that he is not God.
- ■Boundaries should be accompanied by consequences.
- ■Boundaries and consequences should be communicated BEFORE an abusive situation arises.
