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
GROWING **E**DGES

Let us consider together how Christians are transformed into the image of Christ. That's our destiny as believers according to Romans 8:29. How does this happen in our life? What role does the local church have?

The Process

I see the process of being conformed to the image of Christ as an invitation to participate with the Triune God in making us like Jesus. 2 Peter 1:3 says that his divine power "has given everything needed for life and godliness." But even though everything is available for our transformation, we must cooperate with God in that process. Let me suggest that there are four dimensions to this transforming process—intentionality, the spiritual disciplines, a plan or structure, and follow-through.





There are the **spiritual disciplines**, tools to help us cooperate with God in our spiritual formation—prayer, fasting, worship, and so on. These tools have been passed down to us through Scripture, the Church's ancient traditions, and the saints, who exemplified their use and value.

Then, just as we need routines to help us accomplish our daily duties, so we need a **structure** to help us implement the disciplines.

Finally, once the structure is in place we need **follow-through**. This is the hard part. Asking God into our lives is not so hard. Even setting up a plan to implement the disciplines can be fun. But carrying out a long-term plan by ourselves is something else.

Becoming Like Christ

The good news is that Jesus did not call us to a do-it-yourself Christianity. He gave us each other. Enter the local church parish. Ideally every Christian is involved in a local church where worship, the sacraments, and godly relationships help them "keep the faith." However, in a large church people can get lost in the shuffle. Meetings and responsibilities can divert attention from the real work of the church—making us like Christ.

I have discovered that being part of a small group deepens the effects of corporate worship, helps establish me in Christ, and holds me to my commitments. A recent book published by Upper Room Books, *Companions in Christ: A Small-Group Experience in Spiritual Formation*, provides an excellent structure for small groups which any parish could implement.

In his new book, *Renovation of the Heart* (to be published by NavPress this month), Dallas Willard outlines three basic goals of the local parish and its small groups:

- Making disciples that are apprentices of Jesus Christ.
- Immersing apprentices at all levels of growth in God's presence.
- Transforming disciples inwardly in such a way that doing the words and deeds of Christ are not the focus, but the natural outcome or side effects.

By this definition, becoming like Christ is the number one priority of Christians and their local church. Everything else is a result. And we are in it together, praise God.

INTENTIONALLY GROWING IN GRACE

I accepted Christ as Savior in 1975 when I was 19. I then did what I was told to do—got active in church. I went to graduate school in the fall of 1976 and almost instantly became a college/career Sunday School teacher. This was the beginning of seeking to do what I was led to believe was "The Way" of Christ. Over the many years I've worked in church in almost every conceivable capacity: youth director, door-to-door evangelism, royal ambassadors, AWANA, recreation director, teacher, campus minister, elder, deacon, men's ministry, vacation Bible school, inner-city food distribution . . . and so it goes.

After almost 19 years I realized that I was trying very hard to "do" which, I was told, would lead me into a closer walk with Jesus. But the emperor had no clothes. In 1994 I was at the point that I realized I'd spent all that time doing "holy" work, church work, but it was mostly the same old Jerry doing it on my own—"lead, follow, or get out of my way." I came to a crisis where I determined that either I would find a path to a vital relationship with Jesus—one like the New Testament describes—or I'd quit this "church thing" altogether. I had no spiritual power, no spiritual strength, little interactivity with Jesus, and my prayer life was almost non-existent.

Much like the prodigal, Jesus was just waiting for me to come to my senses. Sometime in late 1993 or very early in 1994, I found on my bookshelf a book I'd owned since 1982, *Celebration of Discipline*, written by Richard Foster. I'd never been able to read it before, though I had tried on several occasions. Now it was as if I'd discovered a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. Here was a way of discipleship that opens a life to Jesus.

In early 1994 I heard that Richard Foster had founded a new ministry called Renovaré and was going to speak at a conference in Boulder, Colorado, very close to where Vicky and I were living. We registered, looking on it as a weekend get-away for we stayed at the very nice Boulder Broker Hotel. We feared we would come away from the Conference guilt-ridden, beaten up again by a preacher with more unbearable "oughtta-dos" to "sell."

But NO! We found people who were living in grace, expressing peace, who clearly thought of themselves as no-big-thing but knew Jesus and could genuinely show us *how* to walk with Jesus in a way that fits into life and produces real spiritual fruit. Peacefulness, gentleness, joy, humor, hope, love—the Fruit of the Spirit—was tangibly present and we were **trained** in how **intentionally** to grow in grace.

Life hasn't been the same since. Jesus met me in my need. Jesus is the one and only answer to life—all of life. With many starts and stops I have imperfectly and inconsistently put into practice what I was taught, but I started and I will not stop. While I'm still very much a work-in-progress, I at least know where and how to find the One who gives Abundant Life.

We are called to make disciples, teaching everyone who is willing to obey Jesus. This is why I teach. This is what I want for you very much—the Abundant Life which is the obedient life (John 10:10). As you look forward, won't you invest some time in learning how to grow in grace? The fruit of the Spirit is: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, meekness, gentleness, and self-control. My prayer is, and always shall be, that you grow in grace so that the fruit of the Spirit may ever more abound in you and through you to the glory of Jesus.

RENOVARÉ Spiritual Formation Group Order of Meeting

After a few moments of collective silence, the leader for the week reads the Opening Words aloud.

I. OPENING WORDS

Welcome to the Renovaré Spiritual Formation Group [or other chosen name]. May God's Holy Spirit bless us, and may we find fellowship and encouragement during this time together.

Remember, we gather together with one purpose—to become better disciples of Jesus Christ. We do this by encouraging one another to keep Jesus' word, which, as he said, is what we naturally do when we love him (John 14:23-24). Through the grace of mutual accountability, we strive to inspire one another to love and good works.

Please keep in mind that everything said here is to be held in confidence. Only then can we feel free to share openly and honestly. All hopes and dreams, all fears and failures—even our joys and successes—are to stay within these walls. This is how we help each other.

As a group, read the Covenant aloud and in unison.

II. COVENANT

In utter dependence upon Jesus Christ as my ever-living Savior, Teacher, Lord, and Friend, I will seek continual renewal through

- Spiritual exercises
- Spiritual gifts
- Acts of service.

Beginning with the leader, take turns reading the Common Disciplines aloud until all six disciplines have been read.

III. COMMON DISCIPLINES

- 1. By God's grace, I will set aside time regularly for prayer, meditation, and spiritual reading and will seek to practice the presence of God.
- 2. By God's grace, I will strive mightily against sin and will do deeds of love and mercy.
- By God's grace, I will welcome the Holy Spirit, exercising the gifts and nurturing the fruit while living in the joy and power of the Spirit.
- 4. By God's grace, I will endeavor to serve others everywhere I can and will work for justice in all human relationships and social structures.
- 5. By God's grace, I will share my faith with others as God leads and will study the Scriptures regularly.
- 6. By God's grace, I will joyfully seek to show forth the presence of God in all that I am, in all that I do, in all that I say.

IV. QUESTIONS OF EXAMEN

- 1. In what ways has God made his presence known to you since our last meeting? What experiences of prayer, meditation, and spiritual reading has God given you? What difficulties or frustrations have you encountered? What joys and delights?
- 2. What temptations have you faced since our last meeting? How did you respond? Which spiritual disciplines has God used to lead you further into holiness of heart and life?
- 3. Have you sensed any influence or work of the Holy Spirit since our last meeting? What spiritual gifts has the Spirit enabled you to exercise? What was the outcome? What fruit of the Spirit would you like to see increase in your life? Which disciplines might be useful in this effort?

Beginning with the leader, each member shares his or her experiences from the previous week. The Questions of Examen (or Reflection Questions) can be used to help focus the discussion. As time permits, encourage each member to answer at least the first question in each set.

forming, conforming, and transforming us into the image of Christ. For those who may have lost their copy of the "Order of Meeting" or who have never tried using it in their small group, it is reproduced here in the size and format identical to that found in the back of the *Workbook*. We suggest that you trim 3/4 inch from each side and the top at the top edge of the grey box (finished size = 7" wide by 9-1/8" long). Next get it laminated. It will then be the right size to slip into the *Workbook* as you are using it and will last for years.

- 4. What opportunities has God given you to serve others since our last meeting? How did you respond? Have you encountered any injustice to or oppression of others? Have you been able to work for justice and *shalom*?
- 5. Has God provided an opportunity for you to share your faith with someone since our last meeting? How did you respond? In what ways have you encountered Christ in your reading of the Scriptures? How has the Bible shaped the way you think and live?
- 6. In what ways have you been able to manifest the presence of God through your daily work since our last meeting? How has God fed and strengthened you through the ministry of word and sacrament?

V. LOOKING AHEAD

On which area or areas would you like to work this week? What specific exercise or exercises would you like to try?

week. These questions may be used as guidelines. Use copies of the Worksheet found in A Spiritual Formation Workbook (James Bryan Smith, San Francisco: Harper SanFrancisco, ©1993, 1999) to record what you and the other members have chosen to do. Writing these commitments down will help you remember what others are doing and give you a

chance to pray for them.

Beginning with the leader, allow

time for each member to share

his or her plans for the coming

After each person has had a chance to share, the leader asks if anyone in the group has a particular need or knows of situations that would benefit from prayer. Members record these concerns on their Worksheets so that they can pray for them over the coming days. In addition, the leader invites someone to lead the group in prayer for those concerns. When the prayer is finished, members join hands in a circle and pray the Lord's Prayer aloud and in unison.

At the conclusion of the Lord's Prayer, the leader ends the meeting by reading the Closing Words aloud and then asking for a volunteer to lead the next meeting.

VI. THE LORD'S PRAYER

Our Father, who art in Heaven,
Hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come,
Thy will be done,
On earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses
As we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
But deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever and ever.

VII. CLOSING WORDS

Amen.

Please remember that what we have said and heard in this gathering was spoken in confidence and should remain here when we leave. May the love, peace, and power of God be with us during this week. Amen.

GROWING PAINS

Thank you for your generous gifts toward the start up of the English expression of Renovaré and the "New Projects Director" position. Funds were forwarded to England the first week in January and the remaining monies were retained to underwrite the new position. We feel the response indicates that the time is right to expand our staff so that we can develop new resources and programs. We're hoping to promote Lyle SmithGraybeal to "New Projects Director" and hire a Conference Coordinator around July 1 which will give them time to work together before the fall schedule starts.

Prior to the conference in Wheaton, Maryland, held on March 8-9, Dallas Willard led the Thursday Bible Study for White House staff and then met with other key staff over lunch. Felicia and Lyle SmithGraybeal attended the Bible Study and felt that Dallas' teaching was well received.

We have hired a consultant to redesign our home page (www.renovare.org). The new look should be on line around May 1, so check it out! Long-range plans include adding the capabilities of ordering resources, filling out Covenant Cards, updating mailing addresses, making contributions, and finding a spiritual formation group.





A Spiritual Formation Workbook, James Bryan Smith with Lynda L. Graybeal

A beginning workbook for spiritual formation groups that provides guidelines for starting a group, study plans for the first nine sessions, and a questionnaire that maps the way ahead. The *Workbook* introduces users to the six streams or traditions of Renovaré in a user-friendly, interactive format that takes each person beyond the specific lesson into applying the truths that they learn. The "Order of Meeting" in the back can be used by an individual for the remainer of life in a variety of settings.

Celebration of Discipline, Richard J. Foster

Names twelve Spiritual Disciplines and offers critical insights into how to integrate meditation, prayer, fasting, study, simplicity, solitude, submission, service, confession, worship, guidance, and celebration into our life. In print for over two decades, it is used in many undergraduate schools and seminaries in spiritual formation and discipleship classes, and was named by *Christianty Today* as one of the top ten Christian books of the twentieth century.





Companions in Christ Participant's Book and Companions in Christ Leader's Guide

The *Participant's Book* is a 28-week small-group guide that includes individual reading and reflection as members participate in community sharing and explore common stories, questions, and discoveries about their relationship to Jesus Christ. It provides settings for learning the Spiritual Disciplines of prayer, Scripture, study, worship, ministry, and Christian conversation. With the accompanying *Leader's Guide* this would be a way to introduce a group to some of the Spiritual Disciplines before or after they read *Celebration of Discipline* and before they take up *A Spiritual Formation Workbook*.

The Contemplative Pastor, Eugene Peterson

Any pastor who needs to get back to the spiritual basics will do well to read and absorb this book. Known to many as "a pastor's pastor," Eugene Peterson speaks words of wisdom and refreshment for pastors caught in the busyness of preaching, teaching, and "running the church." To get at the often-overlooked essentials of ministry, Peterson redefines the meaning of *pastor* through three vivid, strenthening adjectives—*unbusy*, *subversive*, and *apocalyptic*—and then focuses on pastoral ministry and spiritual direction "between Sundays."



Missing Peace, Glandion Carney

Fictional story about Joan who is financially and professionally successful but whose life is empty at the core, and the correspondence with Brother Theodore that helps her discover real fulfillment. A good example in a readable format of a practice largely abandoned in the twentieth-century—spiritual direction via the written word rather than face-to-face.





Shaped by the Word, M. Robert Mulholland Jr.

Explains how to listen for the voice of God in the Bible, move from *informational* reading to *formational* reading of the Bible, and give up "control" over the text and let God lead the reading and understanding. The methods Mulholland explores that bring us into a more vibrant relationship with God are classic Christian paths to spiritual formation through Scripture reading, methods that have been overshadowed by a bias in our time for analytical Bible study.
