Look for a program that will fit into your life in a manageable way. Take a look at your current priorities. How much time do you have to dedicate to your studies? Can you make a full-time commitment, or do you need more flexibility?

Does the school have a sense of community?


When you're able to connect with other students on the same path, you are more likely to succeed. Interacting with your peers, forming friendships, and offering support to others enriches the learning experience and keeps you focused.


Does the school have tutors that work within the industry?

This is the hallmark of a true tutor; someone who doesn't just know it, they live it. They walk the talk, which means that they can guide others to do the same. A tutor with only academic understanding will have a more difficult time guiding students in how to apply knowledge in a practical way in real-world situations.

Does the school offer experiential as well as academic education?

When it comes to learning, there is no substitute for direct experience. When you integrate principles into your own life, you understand them in a deeper way. This becomes a practical foundation for working in the design industry.





Is there a rotating group of tutors or do the same tutors work closely with students throughout the program?

Many institutions recruit important faculty members, with each member teaching one or two classes. While it can be nice to be exposed to different points of view, this approach impacts the tutor-student relationship, which is not given the opportunity to develop over time. When tutors are present with you throughout the process, they understand your opportunities and challenges and how to support your success.

Learning from many people with different levels of expertise can be confusing and contradictory. It's more difficult to see how everything works together. There are many ways to do things, and you don't need to learn them all in order to be an interior designer.

Look for a program that guides you to learn a proven approach in a comprehensive way, rather than skimming the surface of many things. This is what separates the amateur from the master.

What kind of feedback do you get on your assignments?

When tutors provide thoughtful, thorough feedback on your assignments, you can truly integrate the material and deepen your understanding. If feedback isn't a cornerstone of a program, you may misunderstand key principles and feel unprepared to start your practice.

Does the school actively engage with the industry and consistently update their educational resources?

Opt for a school that actively participates in the industry and diligently keeps their educational materials up to date, thereby guaranteeing that students receive the latest and most relevant information available.

Will the school prepare you for your journey after you study?

Choose a school that not only focuses on providing quality education during your studies but also ensures that you are equipped with the necessary skills and support to succeed after graduation.


