(Betty Marion White Ludden)

The "First Lady of Television"

Globally beloved radio, film, stage, and television star known for capturing hearts and minds while pioneering cultural change both on- and off-screen. Avid champion of social causes, including animal welfare, racial equality, and LGBTQ+ rights, leveraging fame and influence to capture widespread attention for key issues.

Notable Achievements

- Consistently captured the heart s and minds of audiences over a seven-decade career (the TV industry's longest), seamlessly transitioning from radio to early television and maintaining a constant position at the forefront of popular media and culture.
- Known as the "First Lady of Television" and the "First Lady of Game Shows" for a career laden with industry firsts, including: first woman to produce a sitcom, first producer to hire a female director, and producer and host of the first American network variety TV show to feature an African American performer.
- · Widely adored entertainer, with an astonishing 27 awards and 57 award nominations over her 70-year career.
- Constant champion of social causes despite potential career impacts; a vocal supporter and advocate for LGBTQ+, racial equality, and animal welfare issues.
- Notable shows: The Hollywood Squares, The Bold and the Beautiful, The Carol Burnett Show, The Mary Tyler Moore Show, The Golden Girls.

Entertainment Career Highlights

Multiple Companies 1949 – 2021

Actress & Producer

Successfully transitioned from radio to television, pioneering countless media firsts as a celebrated industry trailblazer. Paved the way for the modern American television landscape, effortlessly introducing landscape-altering shifts while maintaining audience favor over a seven-decade career (the longest television career on record). Career highlights include:

- Guest Roles, Recurring Roles, Big Screen (1990 2009): Maintained a central position in American TV and film as a frequent guest-star of widely popular talk and sketch shows, soap operas, commercials, and feature-length films.
 - Returned to film alongside Sandra Bullock and Ryan Reynolds in *The Proposal*, signaling the beginning of a 20-year resurgence which seamlessly integrated White into the modern film and TV landscape.
 - Appeared in Mars, Incorporated's You're not you when you're hungry Snickers bar campaign, capturing the attention and love of new audiences.
 - Became the oldest host of Saturday Night Live in 2010 at the age of 88.
 - Nominated for a Primetime Emmy (Outstanding Supporting Actress in a Comedy Series) for Hot in Cleveland.
 - Contributed to the success of the highest-rated Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation, The Lost Valentine (Nielsen Media Research).
 - Hosted and executive produced Betty White's Off Their Rockers, a charming twist on the prank-show format, which
 received three Emmy nominations.
- The Golden Girls (1985 1992): Received critical acclaim and Emmy nominations every year of the program's sevenseason run as the much-loved character, Rose Nylund.
 - Earned a permanent spot on the American pop-culture landscape.
 - Demonstrated exceptional versatility, fully embodying the role of the "terminally naïve" Nylund in a major departure from prior characters.



- Mama's Family (1983 1984): Reprised a beloved character originated in sketches (The Carol Burnett Show).
- The Mary Tyler Moore Show, The Carol Burnett Show, The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson (1973 1983):
 Cemented her place in American audience's hearts as a frequent guest and returning character on groundbreaking and time-tested sitcoms and talk/variety shows.
 - Relaunched The Betty White Show, now the fourth iteration of the program, with a single season run.
 - Awarded second and third Emmy Awards as Sue Ann Nivens (The Mary Tyler Moore Show).
 - Notable appearances (TV shows, movies, and miniseries): The Carol Burnett Show, The Tonight Show Starring
 Johnny Carson, With This Ring, The Best Place to Be, Before and After, The Gossip Columnist.
- First Lady of Game Shows (1960 1970): Earned a name as a staple of network game and talk shows, appearing as a frequent guest on numerous high-viewership shows including Jack Paar and Johnny Carson's *The Tonight Show*.
 - Began a nearly 20-year run as a co-host and co-commentator (alongside Roy Neal and Lorne Greene) for NBC's annual Rose Parade Broadcast.
- The Betty White Show (TV, 1952 1954 / 1957 1958): Reimagined the talk/variety show for television, hosting and producing the daily live program while continuing to shape the future of American TV through multiple industry "firsts".
 - Paved the way once more for women in television as the first producer to hire a female director.
 - Featured, for the first time on an American network variety TV show, an African American performer Arthur Duncan – amidst Jim Crow era America. Famously responded "I'm sorry. Live with it," in response to threats of boycotts among southern states, and subsequently increasing Duncan's airtime.
- Co-founder of Bandy Productions (1949 1953): Partnered with writer George Tibbles and producer Don Fedderson.
 - Capitalized on familiar sketch characters to create all-new TV shows with a ready-made viewership.
 - Broke new ground as one of the first women in TV to wield full creative control on screen and behind the camera.
 - Earned her first Emmy Award Nomination (Best Actress, 1951) and then win (Los Angeles Emmy Award, 1952).

Radio Host & Personality

Earned a name as an engaging, witty, and dynamic entertainer through a range of commercials, radio shows, and an eponymous talk and variety program.

• Launched *The Betty White Show*, a radio talk and variety show which shared its name with three additional shows across media types over the following 70 years.
