Overview

Rooted in a deep and abiding belief in the power of early childhood education, the National Child Research Center (NCRC) is a joyful, mission-driven school serving preschool-aged children in Washington, DC. Founded in 1928 as the city's first preschool and a pioneer in inclusive education, NCRC is the oldest continuously operating preschool in DC and remains steadfast in its commitment to a child-centered, playbased approach that fosters the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development of each child. Located on a spectacular 2-acre campus in DC's Cleveland Park neighborhood, NCRC serves children ages 2 through 5 and their families through a warm, collaborative, and inclusive learning community. The school is known for its rich traditions, play-based, emergent curriculum, commitment to research-informed practices, and deep dedication to diversity, equity, and community. NCRC seeks a compassionate, visionary Head of School to begin July 1, 2026, who will lead the school into its next chapter while honoring its legacy and mission.



National Child Research Center nurtures the whole child—socially, emotionally, and intellectually—toward a lifelong love of learning. Informed by current research and continuing education, NCRC's exceptional faculty guide each student's unique development through a play-based, child-centered curriculum in a diverse, family-focused community, with a commitment to the inclusion of children who benefit from additional supports and adaptations.

Community

At NCRC, the community is both the heart and the engine of the school. Faculty and staff are deeply committed educators who bring warmth, intentionality, and expertise to their work each day. Families are engaged partners in their children's learning and development, drawn to NCRC by its holistic approach and caring environment. NCRC's community thrives on a culture of belonging. The school's long-standing commitment to diversity and equity is reflected in its admissions practices, pedagogy, and professional development. NCRC is one of the only schools of its size that has a full-time Director of Diversity, Equity and Community (DEC) who leads classroom conversations, hosts parent affinity groups, and facilitates professional development about DEC. Parents, faculty, and alumni alike note that NCRC is a place where lifelong connections are made.



Program

NCRC's program is built around three age group tiers: Early Learning (2-3), Preschool (3-4) and Prekindergarten (4-5). The program places play, exploration, and relationships at the center of learning. NCRC's curriculum supports growth across all developmental domains through rich, emergent investigations and collaborative projects. Hallmarks include:

- Play Based Learning: Classrooms are environments of joyful inquiry where children make meaning through exploration and discovery. Curriculum is rooted in research and child development theory, and guided by our school Pedagogista.
- Social Emotional (SEL) Practices: A school-wide commitment to SEL practices and the Social Thinking Curriculum promotes self-awareness, empathy, and perspective-taking.
- Inclusion Program: All classes include neurodiverse learners who can thrive in a playbased setting, where faculty provide supports and adaptations in response to individual needs. Inclusive classrooms cultivate in children respect, empathy, and acceptance of others.
- Child Development Team (CDT): The CDT includes a full time counselor, speech and language pathologist, and occupational therapist who run special programs (Early Beginning and Play Pals). The team helps establish individualized goals, and provides supports and adaptations for all students.
- Outdoor Learning: NCRC's spacious, natural playground and garden spaces encourage wonder and foster environmental stewardship.
- Specialist Enrichment: Children participate in Mindful Movement, music, and library programs that complement their classroom experiences.







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- Auxiliary Programs: An extended-day program, Later Gators, is available until 5:00, and Summer Camp is available for 7 weeks.
- Ongoing Schools: Outplacement counseling is a critical component of the program. NCRC provides significant guidance and support to children applying to the area's independent, parochial, and public schools, many of which are the most competitive in DC.

- Ensuring program excellence, delivery of rich and immersive experience for students, guided by NCRC mission, philosophy, and pedagogy.
