Despite recent crackdowns by the FBI and other law enforcement agencies, it is still very common today for hate crimes (also known as bias crimes) to be identified. In fact, the FBI reported an 8% increase in hate crimes nationwide in 2006 compared to 2005. In 2006, approximately 8,000 hate crimes were committed and anti-blacks (2,640), anti-Semitic (967), anti-white (890), anti-male homosexuals (747), anti-Hispanic (576), anti-Muslim (156) and anti-muslim homosexuals (163) were selected in this order. People who commit hate crimes are not thought to be very different from most people. In a study conducted at the University of California, Los Angeles profiled 550 hate crime criminals to determine factors that could contribute to the transgression of hate crimes. The researchers found that criminals tend to exhibit more aggressive and antisocial behavior, but in most cases are not mentally unstable. Hate crime perpetrators are generally not psychopaths, says Dr. Jack Glazer of the University of California, Berkeley. They are mostly 'normal', but they are overly biased. If violence or destruction is relatively prone, it can lead to hate crimes. UCLA studies have also shown that many of the perpetrators studied have a strong family history of violence and abuse. In general, hate crimes are more likely to be planned and intentional than voluntary. Hate crimes are considered message crimes in that they intend to send a clear message to an intended group that they don't like and are not welcome, according to the APA. Recent efforts to strengthen hate crime prevention legislation have been halted by insufficient votes to ensure the bill's passage. Current federal law, enacted in 1968, allows prosecution of hate crimes only if it meets two criteria: the crime would have been motivated by racial or religious prejudice, which would prevent voting, school, or other federal protections. Under this law, hate crimes based on gender, disability, or sexual orientation are not accepted [Source: Civilrights.org]. The current civil rights law allows people to prosecute violent crimes regardless of their motives, even though they recognize the limitations of existing hate crimes laws. Proponents emphasize that all violent crimes should be prosecuted quickly and fairly, regardless of their motives. Through the path of hate crime, hatred has a tremendous impact on society. Dr. Glaser says it can certainly play a role in alienating communities that commit hate crimes and are common targets for hate crimes. These acts of violence and contempt promote hatred by polarizing groups and fostering negative emotions.
