- a. [FISCALLY RESPONSIBLE] Passing a new operating levy for our public schools is the fiscally responsible thing to do. The leadership in the CH-UH school district has already stretched the previous levy an entire year beyond its original three year expected lifespan, and only balanced its budget through drastic cuts. Our schools shouldn't have to endure additional harmful cuts just to get by. (60 words)
