# 1. How to Check if You're Eligible for Canada Permanent Residency

This is the very first step. Before starting the process, you have to check if you're what Canada needs. This can be checked via the **Comprehensive Ranking System (CRS) Tool**: [www.cic.gc.ca/english/immigrate/skilled/crs-tool.asp](http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/immigrate/skilled/crs-tool.asp).

## 1.1. Minimum Eligibility Criteria for Federal Skilled Worker (FSW)

To qualify to apply for express entry permanent residence under the [Federal Skilled Workers \(FSW\)](#) program, there are minimum eligibility requirements that you need to meet.

You will need to have a CRS score of at least 67 points out of a total of 100 in the grid used to assess candidates. Do not try to calculate your CRS score before getting at least the minimum 67 points needed to be able to apply.

If you haven't done your [Education Credential Assessment \(ECA\)](#), and/or passed your language tests, you can try and guess your points. You can try the free [Degree Equivalency Tool from WES](#) to have an idea on your Canadian equivalency. The free Equivalency tool is not a replacement for ECA and is only there to give you an indication of what your Canadian Equivalency may be in your official ECA results.

Keep in mind that you cannot enter the Canada express entry pool without having your ECA and language results in hand.

### 1.1.1. CRS Scores for Education

Education	Points (Maximum: 25 points)
Doctoral (Ph.D) degree	25
Master's or professional degree	23
Two or more post-secondary credentials (one must be for a program of at least three years)	22
Post-secondary credential of at least three years	21

Post-secondary credential of two years	19
Post-secondary credential of one year	15
Secondary (high school) diploma	5

### 1.1.2. CRS Scores for Work Experience

Your work experience must be within the last 10 years and must be paid work. Volunteer work and internships do not count. It must belong to type/level 0, A or B using the [NOC \(National Occupation Classification\)](https://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/immigrate-canada/express-entry/eligibility/find-national-occupation-code.html) code: <https://www.canada.ca/en/immigration-refugees-citizenship/services/immigrate-canada/express-entry/eligibility/find-national-occupation-code.html>. It must also be continuous and stretch at least over a year (30 hours per week), or an equal amount of part-time work experience (at least 15 hours per week for 2 years).

You can accumulate your work experience from two employers, as long as both jobs fall within the same NOC.

#### **1.1.4. IELTS Scores & CLB Levels**

There are two official languages in Canada: French and English. Therefore, if you're a skilled worker who want to immigrate to Canada, you must prove you have language proficiency in either French or English or both. To show your proficiency in English language, you are required to take language examination that is recognized by the Canada federal government.
