## Why did I write this book

In my career as a software developer, I worked with great people. Steadily, I grew in my role until I finally ended up at a big insurance company in the Netherlands and was thrown into the lead software developer role. I got the role because I was the most senior developer among my internal colleagues. And thus, at some point, my manager told me, "You're it." Unprepared, bewildered, and with a schedule that was eating massive chunks out of my coding hours, I was thrown into the role.

I was thrown into the deep end of the pool. I was swimming barely, and it did not look too pretty.

I went into "red alert mode" and got to work. Fortunately, I have had my fair share of crisis situations. And for crisis mode, I am prepared. I learned from the best. The best thing you can do in a crisis is stop, step back, think, and evaluate. Pick your first best action and execute that without hesitation.

And that's what I did. I searched for relevant books and documentation. I asked around in my network. I needed to know what was expected of me. I sure got many "I don't know, I guess you just lead." This is good advice, but it lacks actionable qualities. There were some helpful resources, a chapter in a book, a few helpful peers in my network, and a lot of gut feeling.

I did OK. I flapped my arms a bit here and there, but I was learning and getting better, and I was finding my rhythm again and again.

Steadily, more and more different tasks were being put on my plate. Technical challenges but also more planning, more meetings, more everything. I was spending less and less time "doing the actual work" (coding). I was losing my mind because I kept getting interrupted while trying to develop software. Getting interruptions is part of my current role. But I had to overcome these challenges or accept doing my work somewhat out of control.

So, after a lot of reading, talking to my scrum master, hooking up with peers in similar situations, and just learning—over and over, week after week—this book is where I am now. It is a compilation of my lessons as a lead software developer.

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# Should you want to be a Lead Software Developer

When the day comes that you are asked to become the lead software developer, think about it. Do you want to do this? Are you a fit for such a role? Do you want to take a step, even small, back from filling your day with as much software development as possible?

As a lead developer, you are in a critical position between your developer peers and the business (represented by your manager or other business person). You will spend less time coding and more time working with soft skills. It all depends on the exact requirements laid out or demanded by your environment. You will have to focus your efforts on what your team needs to deliver on the business requirements. You may need to spend time developing

your team's technical skills or working with business representatives to nail down the requirements for your team. You might also have to stand tall in creating a sustainable culture and pace for your team.

An interesting aspect is that you will not be hierarchically superior to your peers; that's the task of the individual managing your team. Do note that, depending on how your manager operates, you could significantly impact the direction your team gets from your manager and significantly influence their performance appraisal.

The most crucial part will be that you will need to have or develop some soft skills depending on the exact requirements of your environment. But you will also be required to perform a delicate balancing act. What is essential for the team, and what for the business? How do you balance your time between coding and other lead role-related activities? How do you hang on to precious blocks of uninterrupted coding time without being unavailable to your team when it counts? Delegating, coaching, sponsoring—what are those?

So, when asked, "Do you want to be the lead developer?" Make sure to take some time. Consider your weaknesses. Ask why they want to appoint you. Indicate your expectations. And ask for support in developing your soft skills.

Make sure you feel comfortable spending more time discussing, documenting, and negotiating. By providing a good technical sounding board, you can prevent everyone from being disappointed. But this is not easy. Also, note that there can be politics involved. The best way to deal with any situation is to be honest and document choices, assignments, and agreements.
