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Florida Energy Advocacy Groups Sound Off on Florida's Exclusion from Federal Five-Year Offshore Energy Plan

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – Florida energy advocacy groups today gathered to discuss the omission of Florida from a proposed federal plan to conduct offshore oil and natural gas exploration between 2017 and 2022. The groups called for federal leaders to continue the momentum of recent years, in which the United States has positioned itself as an energy leader.

At a news conference hosted by the Florida Energy Forum, the Consumer Energy Alliance and Florida Vets4Energy, advocates spoke about the positive impact the energy sector can have on job creation, diversification of the state's economic portfolio, national security and consumers. Members of Energy Citizens, an energy advocacy group, attended to show support for offshore energy exploration in Florida.

Also discussed was the economic opportunity Florida loses by being omitted from the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management's Draft Proposed Program, which is part of the 2017-2022 Outer Continental Shelf Oil and Gas Leasing Program. While the program does suggest opening portions of the Atlantic Coast down to Georgia for offshore exploration, it omits areas with known energy resources, such as Florida's Atlantic Coast, the Eastern Gulf of Mexico, parts of Alaska and California.

A January <u>Harris poll</u> of 610 registered voters nationwide found that 79 percent of Americans support increased production of domestic oil and natural gas resources located in the U.S., while at least four out of five believe that additional energy production in the country could increase national security, energy security, lead to more jobs, stimulate the economy and lower energy costs. Nearly two-thirds surveyed support offshore drilling for domestic oil and natural gas resources. A 2014 <u>Florida survey</u> of 1,875 telephone interviews found that more Floridians support offshore energy exploration than those who don't.
