Upgrading Technology is a Continuous Process at Blanco ISD

59 New Computers Being Brought On-line at Blanco High School

Blanco ISD strives to keep itself on the cutting edge of technology.

"Maintaining the computers of the District is a continual process," said Tom Cozzi, Director of Technology for Blanco ISD. "This year, we're installing 59 computers at the high school. These computers will be used for rebuilding a computer lab, and the others will go to the teachers."

"Five of these computers will be used in a newly-created 'credit recovery' lab, in which students who are short credits for graduation may take a course on-line."

"The old computers are being re-distributed. Some will remain with the teacher, some will go to other campuses in the District as needed."

"Last year, we did the same thing for the elementary school teachers. Next year, we're going to be looking to do the same thing for the middle school teachers and the middle school lab. The rotation just continues on."

The District has implemented some significant technology

initiatives within the last two years. The District has: installed 65 ceiling mounted data projectors in classrooms throughout the District; implemented 20 Interwrite Boards Districtwide; upgraded the District website; added bandwidth to the District's Internet connection; and integrated technology to improve instruction and assessment through student response cards, the AEIS-IT software disseminating TAKS and benchmark data, etc.

"I'm very pleased," said Cozzi. "When I think of the things we've gotten done, we've

accomplished a lot.
We're constantly maintaining our technology
on a daily basis."

"I have a saying that I believe in: 'instruction drives technology.' I believe that shapes our philosophy."

Six Blanco Middle School Students Attend NCAA Women's Final Four as "Junior Journalists"

Several aspiring journalists from Blanco Middle School had a once-in-a lifetime opportunity—participate in the NCAA women's basketball Final Four showdown in San Antonio as Junior Journalists.

"This all started to come together last January," said middle school counselor Lisa Rogers. "We're on the NCAA's mailing list, and we got information that they were going to sponsor a Junior Journalist program for middle school students. I followed through with them, and they accepted six of our students into the program."

Students in the program received a press pass, which allowed them access to all press conferences, the floor, the press room, and even the locker rooms. Students also attended workshops on press procedures, methods, etc. They even talked with ESPN's Sportscenter team.

"Sue Donohoe, NCAA Vice-President for Div. I Women's Basketball, came in and spoke to the girls. She told them that even if they don't pursue a career in journalism, that the things they will experience in this program will open their eyes to all kinds of opportunities," said Rogers.

Students were divided into four groups, and each group was given a topic to write about. The articles produced by the groups were subsequently posted on the NCAA's website.

"I enjoyed this experience a lot," said 8th grader Kristin Watt. "It has opened my eyes to a lot of things that I had never looked at before. I had a great time and hope to someday pursue a job as a media professional."

"This experience has changed my life," said 7th grader Jamie McClinton. "It changed the way I look at basketball and the opportunities that are available in that type of work. It was fun!"
