

**DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS
STUDENT DRUG ABUSE
(REGULATION)**

Students are prohibited from being under the influence of or having in their possession or using or selling any of the following mood-altering chemicals in school or at school-sponsored activities:

1. Alcoholic beverages
2. Marijuana, hashish, or any cannabis derivative
3. Amphetamines (speed, white cross, cocaine, etc.)
4. Phencyclidines (PCP, angel dust, etc.)
5. All hallucinatory chemicals (LSD, mescaline, and others)
6. Barbiturates
7. Opiates
8. Other mood-altering chemicals that can hinder the student's ability to learn or participate and could cause damage to the student's health.
9. Any other controlled dangerous substance prohibited by the laws of the State of Oklahoma.

Each school will provide services for students experiencing problems related to chemical use or chemical dependency. These services will include:

1. Interviews and assessment by qualified staff trained in the identification process.
2. Confidential referral of students and/or family members to appropriate agencies.
3. Group-structured services within the school day.
4. Assistance and support for individual students when needed.

Students who use, possess, are under the influence of, or distribute tobacco, alcohol, unlawful drugs, controlled substances, hallucinogens/inhalants, or possess drug paraphernalia during school time, on school premises, or during school-sponsored activities will be subject to immediate disciplinary actions. These procedures will be followed in instances of drug use and abuse while on school property:

1. If drug use and abuse are suspected:
 - A. The teacher or other staff member will inform the principal immediately.
 - B. The principal will consult with the teacher or other staff member and conduct an investigation.

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- C. The principal will confer with the student and parents.
 - D. Further consultation will be arranged as necessary with administrative, special services personnel, and parents.
 - E. The appropriate law enforcement agency will be contacted.
2. If a student voluntarily admits drug abuse:
- A. The first aim of the school will be to help the student. The principal and/or teacher and/or counselor should inform the student of the procedure including the discussion with parents and referral to an agency that can give him/her help.
 - B. The principal and/or counselor will meet with the parents and recommend a proper plan of action.
3. If a student appears to be under the influence of drugs:
- A. The same procedure will be used as when a student shows signs of a serious illness.
 - B. The principal will be notified immediately.
 - C. The principal and/or counselor shall take charge.
 - D. Parents will be called.
 - E. Medical help will be summoned, if necessary, and arrangements made to transfer the student home or to a hospital.
 - F. The principal will arrange for a parent-administration conference as soon as possible.
 - G. The appropriate law enforcement agency will be contacted.
4. If a student is apprehended dealing with, selling, sharing, or giving drugs:
- A. The incident will be reported to the principal immediately.
 - B. The principal will notify the student's parents and the appropriate law enforcement agency.
 - C. During the automatic three-day suspension, there must be a principal-parent conference and a plan of action developed.
5. If a student is apprehended having drug paraphernalia is his/her possession:
- A. The principal will be notified immediately.

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- B. The appropriate law enforcement agency will be contacted.
 - C. The paraphernalia will be turned over to the parents or local law enforcement agency.
 - D. Automatic three-day suspension during which there must be a principal-parent conference and a plan of action developed.
6. If a student is apprehended flaunting the drug culture, including wearing apparel or jewelry:
- A. The principal will be notified immediately.
 - B. There will be a principal-student conference.
 - C. There will be a principal-parent-student conference.
 - D. Flaunting is defined as: To make a gaudy display, as in dress; be glaring, gaudy, or ostentatious. Flaunting will include wearing apparel or jewelry.
