


United States Naval Academy Blue and Gold Officer Dave Driskell with Mateo A. Simpson

Proclamation







encouraged them to keep working hard to go even further next time. The judge also took a moment to congratulate Coach Hermosillo, named "Best Coach" by the Laredo Morning





AP exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5, where a 5 is equivalent to a grade of A in the corresponding college course. Alejandra not only received the top score of 5; she was also only one of only 100 students in the world to earn every point possible on the AP Spanish Language and Culture Exam, receiving the maximum score on each portion of the exam. "This outstanding accomplishment is likely a direct reflection of the top-quality education being offered at United High School. We applaud Alejandra's hard work and also the AP teacher responsible for engaging students and enabling them to excel in a college-level course", said Packer.
