

Art students compete in BAM!

In November, Art III and Art IV students at Bay High School will be submitting pieces of work for a competition with Arkansas State University's Bradbury Art Museum in the Fowler Center. Back on September 14, twenty-two BHS students, along with art teacher Mrs. Carmer, traveled to the museum to see the Body Parts exhibit, which showcased artwork that depicted humans' emotions and physical movements. Students were shown works of art by six different artists and told to use inspiration from the pieces to create something new for a competition to be held in November. Each student must also supply an artist statement with their work describing how it relates to one of the artists shown in the exhibit. After submission each work will be viewed by a juror, who

will decide if the work will be shown in the exhibit along with works from students from other schools in the area.

Last year as juniors, BHS seniors Lily Emerick and Kaitlyn Norwood were selected to have their pieces shown in the exhibit, and Norwood won first place. "I was really excited," said Norwood.

This year a \$1,000 scholarship will be offered to one graduating senior whose artwork is shown. "I think giving students the opportunity to work with other artists on a larger scale is awesome because it is an opportunity for students to show their talents and creativity and be pushed to think harder," remarked Carmer. The exhibit of selected pieces will be from November 27 through December 2.

November 6, 2018 Bay High School golf team has successful 2018 season

The BHS golf team took their skills out on the green at Burns Park Golf Course in Little Rock on October 4 to compete in the 2A-3A state golf tournament. The team consists of two juniors. Andrew Oster and Nathan Higgins, and two sophomores, Paiton Hartley and Jackson Hunt. At state, Hunt, who was selected to the all-state team, shot an

85, Higgins a 96, and Oster and Hartley both 112. With their combined scores, the BHS golfers finished 6th out of 24 teams. Hunt tied for third place in overall best score, earning himself a spot in the overall tournament that took place on October 11. "It was a true honor, and to be able to compete with the greatest in the state was amazing. It's

something I'll never forget, and I will work twice as hard this off-season to qualify my junior year and excel in what I love," said Hunt. He performed in the tournament along with 17 other players from around the state.

Earlier this season, the team won first in district for the second year in a row. Nathan Higgins won medal-

ist for the boy's division with Hunt as runner-up. "I went all season without getting medalist, but I managed to clutch it out and play better than I've ever played in my life that day," said Higgins. Hartley, Higgins and Hunt were selected to the all-conference team.

The gold team also prevailed in the boys Jr. high game with another Freshman, Gunner Darby, scoring 23 points. The Purple and Gold games are used to give the coaches an indication of what they need to work on before the actual games begin. "It went really well, but it was overall hard to judge without everyone being out there," said Brannen. Two senior players, 6' shooting guard Dax

Gibson, who had a fractured tibia, and 6'8" center Slade Grove, who had Mono, were not able to participate in their last Purple and Gold game.
