#### From the Superintendent's Desk:

# Good Progress Made On Junior High Construction

We are making real good progress on our construction of Phase I of the new junior high school. The building is going to be fantastic upon its completion. The commons area which will also serve as the cafeteria will have a patterned quarry tile floor and has a nice size stage. Cafeteria tables will be small round tables to accommodate four to five students. We plan to buy some tables with game boards on the top. This will be of great use during recreation time.

Because of your approval of the recent bond issue we will be able to open bids on Phase II on November 23, 1981. Time of completion will be dependent upon the bids received as the contractors bid on time as well as dollars. Bids will be taken for the Boevers Gymnasium on the same night. We should be able to award these contracts that same day.

Bids for classroom additions at Clark, Darnaby and Peters will be received November 9, 1981. We may have to postpone contracts being awarded until November 23 since proceeds of the bond issue will probably not be available until November 15.

I want to call your attention to a problem involving students left by parents at the stadium during a varsity football game. Many parents leave their children at the stadium and then come pick them up after the game. It is impossible to get cars into the stadium when the game is nearing the end. There are pay phones at the stadium. However, I am told they are not always in service. I would certainly discourage students from walking down Mingo Road after a game as the traffic situation makes walking a real hazard. I encourage parents to have your children wait at the stadium until traffic is cleared. You can then drive into the west parking lot and pick your child up at the curb.

I am enclosing two charts indicating pupil/teacher ratio by school. Let me caution you about these numbers, they represent the *average* pupil/teacher ratio. Because of leveling across the district, there will be classes with *more* than the average number for higher ability students and classes with *less* than the average for students with lower ability. These numbers exclude art, music, and physical education teachers and do represent self contained classrooms.

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# Parent-Teacher Conferences Scheduled

Parent-teacher conferences have been scheduled for November 17-19. Each Union elementary school will dismiss morning kindergarten classes at 10:00 a.m. Afternoon kindergarten classes in addition to grades 1-6 will be dismissed at 1:30 p.m. to allow parents to schedule conference appointments.

A parent-teacher conference is one of the many steps Union Public Schools is taking to work with parents to build their child's educational program.

Report cards, notes, etc. have their advantages, but the parentteacher conference has one thing more - it's a chance for a teacher to get together with parents to discuss their child's progress in school and learn more about him or her.

#### A parent-teacher conference gives parents a chance to

- · get to know a child's teacher or teachers;
- · learn about the school and curriculum;
- discuss the child's strengths and weaknesses in various areas.

#### It's a chance for parents to

- ask questions;
- give teachers information that will help them understand their child's needs:
- · work with teachers in planning their child's school year.

#### Parents can help! Here's what a parent can do to get ready for the conference

- Make a list of things that will help the teacher understand your child better. For example:
  - ★ any special health needs or problems;
  - \* outside interests and hobbies;
  - ★ feelings about school;
  - \* relationship with brothers and sisters.
- Make a list of things you want to find out from the teacher. For example you may wish to know about:
  - \* services and programs the school offers;
  - ★ discipline policies;
  - ★ grading policy;
  - \* extra curricular activities;
  - ★ daily schedule;
  - ★ homework policy;
  - ★ health and safety programs.

#### Teachers will talk about your child's school progress -

- ability to do school work
- current level in reading and math, including some samples of work he or she has done.
- special interests and abilities
- the books and materials your child is using.

#### Teachers will also discuss your child's social progress

- Do you know
  - \* how he/she gets along with others
  - \* how he/she feels about self
  - \* behavior in and out of class.

#### The teacher will tell parents

- · your child's test results, and what they mean
- · what subjects you child is taking and how he/she is doing
- · your child's strengths and weaknesses in school;
- any observations that can be helpful (whether the child may have trouble hearing or seeing, etc.);
- the teacher may have some suggestions for parents to use at home to help their child in school.

#### Parents can help by giving the teacher any information that will be helpful to understanding their child better. For example:

- important experiences that may be affecting your child (death in the family, a best friend moving away, etc.);
- special medical needs;
- · study habits at home;
- TV habits;
- after-school activities, special interests;
- · feelings toward school;
- · conflict among family members.

In fact, anything that could be affecting your child. It is not necessary to reveal personal information. However, anything said is kept confidential.

#### Your child will undoubtedly be curious about the conference and has a right to be!

- talk it over beforehand to get ideas about what should be covered to relieve anxiety about the conference.
- tell the child what was discussed in the conference (omitting any information he/she may not be mature enough to understand)
- · talk about any changes or new plans discussed
- be positive! The better a child feels about himself, the better he /she will do in school.

#### Helpful hints...

- It's especially helpful if both parents can attend the conference.
- . Be on time try to follow the schedule that has been set up.
- If your schedule is difficult, check with the school about arranging a special time for your conference.
- If you feel you need more time, ask about setting up an additional conference.

#### When the conference is over -

Parents will have a better understanding of all aspects of their child's school experience.

You will know more about his/her

- · strengths and weaknesses,
- special abilities
- · current performance.

And you as a parent should have a plan to help your child do his/her best from now on. This could mean new rules on watching TV, special time for homework, contact with other agencies if necessary, or any other changes you and the teacher have agreed upon. Maybe even a special reward for a job well done!

# **FALL SEASON A SUCCESS**

The fall season is fast drawing to a close. The success of our teams was evident as our continued growth stabilized and we were competing very well in the 5A Class level.

During the next few years the success of our teams will make other scheduling more difficult. This has been the case this year as we have been working on our football schedule for 1982-83. Such teams as Owasso, Tahlequah, Webster and others have indicated that they can no longer play

us. This is obviously a good problem to have as we will have to upgrade our schedule in all sports in 1982-83. Schools such as Muskogee, Memorial and Hale will be added in football. The keys to success in athletics proper include the commitment to extracurricular program by the Board of Education, the Administration, the faculty and the patrons.

The most important ingredient is the student-athlete. We have good student-athletes that are committed to making their school a well respected educational institution as well as a leader in the athletic community.

The commitment by the student body to an activities program was very evident with the celebration of National High School Activities Week October 19-25. Each club, organization, group or team was recognized on a specific day as the week was culminated with the Homecoming Activities on Friday the 23rd. Former President Gerald Ford was the honorary chairman and was most instrumental in making this an important week for over 20,000 high schools in the nation. This year we have over 700 students that participate in some form of activity. This is a credit to the students, their parents and the Union community.

Basketball and wrestling pre-season practices have begun. Coaches Sumner and Goddard are excited about the basketball prospects as they work toward the December 5th opener with Bartlesville College High at the Union gym.

Coach West has over 400 prospects in wrestling as he prepares for another good season. The wrestlers begin their season December 3rd against the Tahlequah Tigers.

Winter sports season tickets are on sale for \$15.00. This entitles the holder to attend all basketball, wrestling and gymnastics, grades 7-12. This *does not* include tournaments during the season or post-season.

# COMMENT

Community support is most essential to an athletic program. This year our season ticket sales for football were the best ever. Our program that is sold at varsity home games is the best in Oklahoma and attendance at our home games is as good as ever. To top this, Security Bank has contributed a sizeable gift to the school in the form of a message board as an addition to the scoreboard at the stadium. The message center is the only one of its kind at a high school in the State of Oklahoma. This is yet another first for the students and patrons of our school district.



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
