The Union School District is among the 617 school systems in Oklahoma to recognize "Students as Top Priority" during the month of April in observance of Oklahoma Year of the Schools, 1982-83.

Oklahoma Year of the Schools was designated to give honor and recognition to 75 years of education in Oklahoma.

This month's theme, "Students: Top Priority" recognizes student accomplishments in areas such as academic achievements, leadership, citizenship, athletics, the arts, involvement in school activities contributions to the community.

This year, Union Public Schools will educate 6,800 students out of approximately 620,000 total students kindergarten through 12th grade in Oklahoma.

This month's Fine Arts opportunities include many exceptional activities that Union patrons can participate in. Two very special annual Fine Arts events are scheduled for April.

On April 21, the District Elementary School Choral Festival will be presented in the high school gym. This event will feature representative choral groups from all six elementary schools. Each of these groups will present a "mini-concert" as a part of the festival. In addition, an All-District Elementary Honor Choir made up of 48 students representing all of the schools will perform. The Elementary Choral Festival will conclude with music by a mass choir of over 350 students. This concert will begin at 7:30 p.m. and no admission will be charged.

The Union District Art Show is planned for April 23 and 24 in the high school gym lobby. This show will feature art works from hundreds of students representing all nine schools. An added feature of this year's art show will be a display of the works of several industrial arts students from Union Schools. This is the second year for our district-wide art show and we expect this year's offerings to be even more exciting than last year. The art show will be open to the public on April 23 from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. and on April 24 from 1:30 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. There is no admission charge for this event.

Union Junior High School's spring musical "Bye, Bye, Birdie" will be presented April 14, 15 and 16 in the junior high school commons area. This production will feature a large singing, acting and dancing cast and an orchestra made up of Union Junior High School students. "Bye, Bye, Birdie" is a delightful story about parents, teenagers, and a singing idol named Conrad. For ticket information call Union Junior High School at 250-9541.

On May 5 all Union band students will participate in this year's "Festirama." This annual event allows a look at all the band students

in the district on one program. "Festirama" will be presented in the high school gym.

On April 29 and 30, Union Schools will host a speech tournament at the high school. This contest will involve speech teams from several area schools. Competition will include twelve competitive speech events.

The music departments successfully competed in district and state OSSAA competitions during March. All of our vocal and instrumental entries were awarded "Excellent" or "Superior" ratings in these contests. Many soloists and ensembles have advanced to state competitions which will be held this month.

On April 19 at 7:00 p.m. Darnaby Rangers and Company, the sixth grade band and the sixth grade strings classes will give a combined concert in the Darnaby gym. April 7, Briarglen students will present the musical "Wheels" at 10:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. in the Briarglen gym.

The patrons of Union Schools have given consistent support to the arts and this has a tremendously positive effect on our students and their feeling of success. Students and instructors put a great deal of work into the concerts, musicals, plays, competitions, and exhibits that are offered to the public.
