



# Graduation Requirements Increased

The graduation requirements were increased from 20 units to 22 units for graduating seniors for the school year 1986-87 during Board of Education action on February 6, 1984.

This action was a result of the general trend toward increasing academic excellence. During the past two years much publicity has been aired about public educa-

tion, not only nationally, but also within the State of Oklahoma. Much of this publicity has been negative concerning the quality of education within the public schools. One must be extremely careful and not over generalize when reading the various national studies, we must look at each school system and consider its community.

The Union Public Schools have faired well considering the national studies. All standardized tests taken by Union students indicate that Union is above the state and national levels of achievement. Regardless of academic achievement scores, we must continue to strengthen our academic standards.

The new graduation requirements will be in effect for the school year 1986-87. This means that the Freshman Class of 1983-84 will be the first group of students that must meet the new requirements. Current Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors will graduate with the 20 unit requirement.

Seniors graduating in 1987 will be required to have the following unit and course requirements

English 4 Units*
Math 2 Units
Science 2 Units
American History 1½ Units
Oklahoma History <sup>-1</sup> / <sub>2</sub> Unit
World History 1 Unit
Health and Physical Education 1 Unit
General Electives

TOTAL - 22 Units

\*A Unit is defined as two (2) semesters of successfully completed work.

It is strongly recommended by the Union School District and the College Board that those students planning to enter college take a minimum of four years English, three years Social Studies, four years Science, two years Foreign Language, and one semester of Computer Science. Those students planning to enter the College of Arts and Science at Oklahoma State University must have two years of Foreign Language at the high school level or, 1 year at the college level effective next year.

Those senior students of 1987 completing 6 units at a Vo-Tech School will be required to have a minimum of 20 units for graduation. However, the specific course requirement will remain in force as stated above.

The State Department of Education has initiated a change in the attendance requirements for Seniors beginning with the School Year 1984-85. Next year's Seniors will be required to be in attendance a minimum of four (4) hours per day. There is an exception to this regulation for those students taking college classes as a Senior. The school counselor can provide those interested with more information on this exception.

As a result of these changes, it is felt that students will be better prepared to meet the challenges ahead, whether it be college or the work-a-day world.

#### Each Child Viewed As An Individual

Special Services at Union includes physical therapy, speech therapy, psychometric/educational evaluations, programs for the learning disabled, mentally and emotionally handicapped, and other low incidence handicaps (multi handicapped, visually impaired, deaf/hard of hearing, etc.). Transportation is a related service provided for children with these special needs.

The State of Oklahoma requires special education for children classified as "failing to thrive from birth." Public law #94-142, a federal law, states that a handicapped child (3 to 21 years of age) is to receive the most appropriate program to meet his/her education needs and that these needs are to be served in the least restrictive environment.

Union Special Services Department views each child as an individual. Our goal for each child is to meet his/her education needs to the fullest extent possible while making every effort to keep him/her in as normal a setting as possible. We believe that each child has the right to be with his/her peer group in the home or the neighborhood school environment.

When a child is determined to require a more restrictive environment, the decision for the placement is made by a 'team'. That team consists of Union's specialty teachers, regular classroom teacher(2), a psychometrist, an administrator and the parent(s) of the child.

Some children come to Union with evaluations conducted by local private agencies and/or public schools in other cities or states. The federal government requires the local district's 'team' to review and assess this information. Often time, further evaluation will be necessary to meet the minimum requirements of the Union battery of tests. The final decision for placement must be determined by the Union 'team' which actively involves the parent(s).

# Union To Host State Championships

Union High School has been selected as one of the sites for the 1984 State Championship Basketball sessions. Union will host the 4A girls competition. Other sites in the city will include the ORU Mabee Center, Jenks and Edison High Schools. The Union gym will be the site for the Thursday, March 8th and Friday, March 9th games. Some excellent basketball will be in store as the

final 8 girls teams from 4A will compete for the coveted state crown.

Union footballers again distinguished themselves by having five students sign full four year scholarships for the football players' ability as well as their scholastic aptitude. Those students and their respective schools are: Chris Kaiser - Tulsa University; Mark Hulet - Central Missouri State University; Jeff Bishop - Central State University; David Dick - Northeastern State University; Jeff Hines - Missouri Southern and Carl Cabbiness has yet to decide.

Union wrestlers placed well in the Webster Dynasty Tournament. The 18 team field was one of the toughest ever assembled in Tulsa. Bill and Jack Cherry and Baron Blakley were all crowned champions. Bill Cherry defeated a previously undefeated two-time state champion from North Dakota in the finals. The team placed 3rd overall. Coach Bill West finds that the grapplers are right on schedule in their preparation for the regional and state tournaments.

The spring season begins on March 1st as the Union base-ballers play Memorial. An exciting 24 game schedule has been established and the baseballers are ready to begin their quest for the season. Coach Larry Arrowood has been conducting early season workouts since December and the players are ready to play instead of practice.

Golf, track, tennis and volleyball will begin the following week with a full slate of activities. Support our spring sports and attend the games of your choice this season.
