# Union Students Rank High In SRA Tests

I think everyone likes to be the bearer of good news. I pride myself in having a good positive attitude about Union Schools and the job we're doing with the students. The test results that we are reporting to you is the proof of the pudding. It tells each of us that our superb faculty is doing a tremendous job of challenging boys and girls to a greater learning experience. You as parents can also take great pride also, not only

I personally feel that from this list above, this school system has the attributes that I listed for Success.

Where in this Great Country can you find a system in a metropolitan area that shows the caring and personal attitude that is exemplified here at Union? Example: (Mr. Jack Cox, Grove Elementary; Gil Cloud, Administration Building; Farah Janssen, Peters Elementary; Grandpa Cherry, Union High School; Lisa Stuckey, Administration Building - etc. & etc.). These caring attitudes have a direct effect on children and their developing haracteristics.

Where in a metro area can you find S.R.A. scores in the high percentage brackets as we have here at Union? Some people have indicated that testing is not valuable, but as a parent I want proof of what my child has learned and standarized testing is one of the best tools for this evaluation. This does not preclude teacher observation or judgement grading, but is an unbiased way to see where our entire teaching core compares nationwide. I am happy to report Union is in the top percentile of National Scores.

In my few years here at Union, Briarglen, Peters and Administration I can reach deep into my heart and thank, first the students who are so caring and show such great respect, secondly the parents who support our system with their moral, and financial backing and who also share with a warmth greater than any place I have ever worked. Thirdly, the professional staff from on line staff to Dr. Wesley Jarman who all share in a team effort second to none in the United States. I have such a great respect for Dr. Jarman who through his leadership encourages the Positive Approach and then lives leadership by example.

So thank you Union Family for giving us the opportunity to work with you and your children and thank you School Board and Dr. Jarman for our jobs that allow all of us this opportunity to say thanks for working in the best - - - Union School District.

Congratulations Mr. Cherry on being named employees off the Month for April, 1984.



#### Seventh Grade Library Marathon Successful

Donna Smith, librarian knows how to make students enjoy learning how to use the library. A Library Marathon was begun last year. All of the English teachers' classes were given various assignments throughout the year. At the end of the year she presented a film festival to the winning teacher's five classes (each teacher's five classes' points were totaled together). A trophy was presented in the awards assembly. Several individual awards were presented also. The runner-up teacher's classes were given a doughnut day.

The Marathon was so successful that she is having it again this year.

Everything is on a voluntary basis. No student is required to earn points, but almost 100% of them do.

Some of the things she challenges the students to do are:

Classroom work sheets are given every two weeks on different things about the library's reference materials, card catalogue, indexes, etc. The worksheets solve puzzles when completed correctly.

Library challenge questions are given periodically. The students go to the library, read the question, and find the answer while there. Questions include finding information in an almanac, an atlas, an encyclopedia, a dictionary, the card catalogue, the vertical file, a particular section of books to learn the Dewey Decimal System, etc. By the end of the year the challenge questions cover all phases of the library.

All materials turned in are checked by the librarian and returned to the students. Wow! That's work!

Donna keeps the classes up-dated. The scores are always very close. They love it and want to win.

The students probably don't even realize how much they're learning while "having fun."

#### YOUTHARTS' 84 Great Success

The High School's Spring Vocal Music Concert is scheduled for May 3 in the UPAC at 7:30 p.m., and the Junior High School Vocal Concert is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on May 8. The Spring Strings Concert will be given at the UPAC on May 14 at 7:30 p.m. The Junior High Symphonic Band Concert is scheduled for May 17 at 7:30 p.m. at the same location.

The High School Drama Department will present their spring production, "You Can't Take It With You", on May 10, 11, & 12 at the UPAC. Curtain time is 8:00 p.m. each night. Tickets may be purchased at the High School Office or at the door.

The Union High School Winterguard competed in the National Contest at Dayton, Ohio and won sixth place in this prestigious contest. The High School Band will compete in Canyon City, Colorado on May 5 and 6. This will be their first time to compete in this contest which traditionally attracts outstanding bands from all over the United States.

Special Olympics is an international program of physical fitness, sports training, and athletic competition for mentally handicapped children and adults. Oklahoma Special Olympics offers 10 official sports -- track & field, swimming, diving, gymnastics, basketball, volleyball, soccer, bowling and wheelchair events.

The Tulsa Area competition was held on Saturday, April 14th. Thirteen Union students from Mrs. Kaltenbach's and Mrs. DeBoer's classes participated in the Special Olympics Track and Field events at LaFortune Park. Opening exercises began with a parade of athletes. Union students proudly displayed a banner proclaiming "UNION PRIDE." The events of the day included the 50 meter and 200 meter runs, the softball throw, and the standing long jump. Each student could choose two of the events to enter. All participating athletes received ribbons and recognition at the conclusion of each event.

Many Union people helped to make this a most memorable day for the students. The school nurses assisted with the necessary entrance and coordinated the physical exams which were conducted by Dr. Cherry and his second year interns from the Oklahoma Osteopathic College.
