Summer Theatre Attracts Union Thespians

Several residents of the Union Community won key roles in "Oliver", Union Summer Theatre's first production which was presented in the Union Performing Arts Theatre July 9-13, 1985.

Darin Farr, a 1984 Union graduate, played the notorious Fagin. Union patrons may remember Darin's outstanding performance as Tevye in the 1984 High School musical "Fiddler on the Roof". Darin says "Being able to perform again on Union's stage is a true honor."

The Artful Dodger was portrayed skillfully by another Union student, James Vannoy. He is currently a junior at Union High School and has previously appeared in "Li'l Abner", "Fiddler on the Roof", and "Babes in Arms".

Don and Margo Henthorn, with their daughter, Barbie, made acting in "Oliver" a family affair. Barbie, no stranger to the stage, has played in Roy Clark's "Country Christmas" on CBS television, has played in "Peter Pan" and "Christmas Carol" for American Theatre Company and played in "Oklahoma!" at Discoveryland. Union audiences have seen her in many productions including "Tom Sawyer", "Bye-Bye Birdie", "Li'l Abner", and "Cinderella". Barbie played the part of Bet in "Oliver". Don Henthorn, playing Dr. Grimwig, made his first stage appearance since he was in the armed services. His wife, Margo, holds a bachelor's degree in voice, organ and piano from Baker University. The appearance she made as Mrs. Bedwin was her Tulsa stage debut. Besides playing Mrs. Bedwin, Margo was costume director and house/box office manager for the production. Don and Margo are also co-presidents of Union High School PTSA for 1985/86.

The part of Charlotte was portrayed by Reagan Thummel, a senior at Union High School. Her experience includes the past school productions of "Music Man", "Bye-Bye Birdie", and

"Fiddler on the Roof". She studies voice and plays the French horn.

A 1984 graduate of Union, Elizabeth Kenley, played Mrs. Corney. She is currently a student at East Central State University where she has been in the productions of "Sound of Music", "Man of LaMancha", "Shadow Box". and "Picnic". But Union will remember her best as Golda in the 1984 high school presentation of "Fiddler on the Roof".

Many members of the adult chorus and children's choir were also Union residents. Union High School's speech and drama teacher, Steven Nibbe, was the producer and is currently president of the board of directors for Union Summer Theatre Productions (USTP). Mr. Nibbe was pleased with the first production saying that they sold a lot more tickets than expected for a first attempt. He hopes the season will break even when ticket sales and donations are tallied for their last production (Bleacher Bums on August 15-17 and 22-24).

The future for Union Summer Theatre Productions looks bright. Steve is optimistic that donations will increase next season as the Union Summer Theatre's reputation spreads. Currently the money that is collected goes to cover production costs, stagecraft and set costs, salary of the director, and salaries of selected musicians. The cast and Steve Nibbe are not paid for their services. The Performing Arts Center is furnished free of charge by the District. This facility is used every day during casting and rehearsals.

UNION CORPORAL PUNISHMENT POLICY

The following is a copy of our school district's corporal punishment procedure. Parents should take special note that they need to notify the school, in writing, EACH YEAR if they do not wish for corporal punishment to be administered to their child.

Corporal Punishment - Corporal punishment may be used by Public Schools as authorized by Oklahoma Statutes whenever a teacher or administrator determines that such action is necessary to enforce school discipline. Corporal punishment may be administered only by teachers and principals in the presence of another certified employee.

In the event that corporal punishment is to be administered to a student, the student will be removed from the class to a place of privacy and informed of the reason for the imposition of corporal punishment. The explanation as well as the administration of corporal punishment should take place in front of a certified employee. In addition, a record of the administration of corporal punishment should be made and signed by the person administering the corporal punishment and the witness.

Any parent who does not wish corporal punishment administered to his child or children should notify the principal of that school in writing annually and that request will be considered. If parents do not wish corporal punishment then other punitive measures will be taken.




UNION OFFERS SUMMER SCHOOL

Summer vacation meant attending summer school classes for some of our Union students. Union's first attempt at summer sessions offered students a variety of choices including both remedial and enrichment classes for grades 4-12. Out of the courses offered, 93 students enrolled in the first session (June 3-28) taking 4th grade math and reading; 6th grade math and reading and first semester English 10.

The second session (July 1-30) had 111 students enrolled for 4th grade math and reading; 5th grade math and reading; 6th grade math and reading; study skills; and computer awareness.

The six teachers employed for the summer school were encouraged by the progress of the summer students. Additional classes would have been offered had the interest been greater; however, due to the lack of enrollment, several did not materialize. We were pleased that Union was able to offer summer school for the first time and hope to have increased interest and response for the 1986 summer session.

HOURS VARY FOR KINDERGARTEN

In an effort to help children adjust to their new environment, the school hours for kindergarten will be adjusted during the first two weeks of school.

The schedule is outlined below:

August 21-23: 8:45 a.m. - 10:15 a.m. for the morning session; 1:45 p.m. - 3:15 p.m. for the afternoon session.

August 30 - September 3: 8:45 a.m. - 10:45 a.m. for the morning session; 1:15 p.m. - 3:15 p.m. for the afternoon session.

September 2 and thereafter: 8:45 a.m. - 11:15 a.m. for the morning session; 12:45 p.m. - 3:15 p.m. for the afternoon session.

Please be sure that children arrive no earlier than 10 minutes before their session is to begin. No bus transportation shall be provided during the first two weeks of school for students going home after the morning session or students coming to school for the afternoon session. Parents will need to make arrangements for children's transportation at the times busses will not be available. Normal two-way transportation will begin the third week of school.

GROUND BREAKING AT STADIUM

The Union Board of Education approved the Omniturf artificial surface to be installed at Union Stadium at their regular July 1st board meeting. The cost of the project was \$464,174.56. By approving this project Union will become the first high school in the state to install an artificial playing surface and one of only two in the nation to have the Omniturf product.

Research was compiled by the athletic department over the past four years relative to cost, injury and long range wearability. Omniturf was the product selected as it had reduced injuries 70% at the University of Oregon and the test data supplied by Penn State University verified these results. Comparative studies showed a marked difference in the injury factor, hardness and resistance to fading over a 5 year period.

Installation is to be completed by August 22nd. When this phase is completed the field will be used for band practice, football practice and physical education without regard to wear and tear and weather conditions. This surface will make Union Stadium a more viable facility from a student use standpoint.
