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A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

In 1976 we started a slogan of "Union Moving UP." Now is the time for all patrons to keep Union Moving UP.

On April 22nd we will go to the polls to vote on a 12 million dollar bond issue. Eight million of the bond issue will be for continued construction of the Intermediate High. This facility is desperately needed to relieve the overcrowding at the Junior High. For now, this facility will house our 8th and 9th graders. But more importantly, it will be ready for use as a 9th and 10th grade facility, at some point in the future, when the High School is no longer able to hold three grades.

Another three million dollars of the bond issue is earmarked for construction and equiping the first two phases of a new elementary school. This school will be located on the south ten acres of the current Jr. High site. The central part of our district is growing in population rapidly. This facility is needed to relieve the overcrowding at Grove and Boevers Elementaries. The site was chosen because we already own the land and could reduce the cost by not having to purchase more land.

Six-hundred thousand dollars will be used for construction of art rooms and the enclosing of the media centers at Clark, Peters and Darnaby Elementaries. By completing these projects we will then have all our elementary schools on an equal level.

The remaining \$400,000 will be used to equip the High School expansion now under construction. Part of the expansion will be completed in the Fall-1986 and funds

will be necessary to pay for Business, Art and Science equipment.

Let me say just a word about our bond issue funding. In the fall of 1984, the patrons of Union overwhelmingly approved a 10 million dollar bond issue. We were told by bond council that a 10 million dollar issue would not raise our taxes. Shortly after approval of the bond issue, our district evaluation was dropped by some 32 million dollars. This action, by the state, caused our taxes then to go up to cover the bond issue. Had our evaluation not been lowered, our taxes would not have increased because of the bond issue.

Once again our Board is striving to hold the line on taxes. Union's current evaluation would have allowed a 14.5 million dollar bond issue. We chose to ask for 12 million so that our taxes would not increase. We are also looking at only selling a portion of the Bonds before June 30, 1986. This would once again lower the amount of bonds on the tax rolls and hold the line on taxes. Remember, Union Board of Education members are Union School taxpayers too.

At a time when our schools are suffering from cutbacks at the state level, we all need to show our Union Pride. It will be impossible to maintain quality education if we do not have adequate facilities to house our students. Let's all keep Union Moving UP. VOTE ON APRIL 22nd!

SUMMER SCHOOL PLANNED

The Union School District is pleased to announce that Summer School will be offered to students in both elementary and secondary schools interested in enrichment and remedial classes as well as make-up classes for credit deficiencies due to subject failure. All summer classes will be held at Union Junior High from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon.

Elementary Summer School will be available to students who have completed 4th, 5th, or 6th grade. Remedial reading and remedial math classes will be offered at no cost to Union students who scored at least one grade level below their present grade level on standardized reading and math tests. Enrichment classes, which include Study Skills and Computer Training (Logo) have a tuition of \$45.00 for each class. Summer classes for elementary grades are 6 weeks in length beginning Monday, June 9th and ending Friday, July 18th with no classes on Friday, July 4. Registration deadline is April 28th.

The Seconday Summer program is designed primarily for students to make up credit deficiencies due to failure during the regular school year. A tuition of \$55.00 will be required for each student for each class in which he/she enrolls. Secondary summer classes are four weeks in length with the first session beginning Monday, June 9th and ending Thursday, July 3rd. The second session begins Monday, July 7th and ends Friday, July 31st. Enrollment deadline for the first session is May 5th. Class offerings are: English 7-12; Social Studies 7-8; American History 9, US History 10, Oklahoma History, Science 7-8; Science HS; Math 7-8; Pre-Algebra, Math HS, Geometry, Typing and Driver Education.

Enrollment forms as well as additional information will be available through each Union school or by contacting the Administrative Center at 252-3561, Ext. 218. Courses with less than 16 students enrolled are subject to cancellation.

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FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

The fact that the state budget is in a real down cycle is not really news to most of you. Just how it affects Union Schools is probably news too - not good news - but news as such.

The state, at the present time, is seeking to cut 487 million dollars from the state budget - education is being cut 86 million dollars. Instead of a 16% budget cut the

86 million dollars represents about a 10% cut.

Dr. John Folks, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, has devised a plan to cut state aid to the 620 districts in Oklahoma. There are two kinds of cuts illustrated below. The 16% reduction is in state aid that would generally be appropriated to schools through the formula or in our case the hold harmless provision. The other cuts are in line item appropriations. The \$1,167,283.18 loss is the loss projected for the coming school year and most observers feel the loss will be greater because of oil is below \$18.00 per barrel and revenues were projected on \$18.00 per barrel prices. I am of the opinion that we must cut \$1.5 million from next years budget in order to anticipate further cuts. Our staff is working in trying to make these cuts. I am requesting your cooperation, understanding and concern that we make these reductions as painless as possible.

SPECIAL MEETING

The Union Board of Education met in special session on the 3rd day of March, 1986. The meeting was called to order at 6:30 p.m. with a quorum present. The following action was taken:

(1) A resolution was introduced authorizing the calling and holding of a bond election held on April 22, 1986, for the purpose of submitting to the registered, qualified electors of Union School District a bond issue proposal of \$12,000,000.

REGULAR MEETING

The Union Board of Education met in regular session on the 3rd day of March, 1986. The meeting was called to order with a quorum present. The following actions were taken:

(1) Motion: to approve the consent agenda. The consent agenda consisted of approving the minutes of February 2nd, 3rd, 6th and 17th, 1986 as presented, approving a resolution "allowing the school district treasurer to deposit all idle funds into interest bearing accounts at the highest rate available", approving the monthly payroll and operating expenses and approving bond fund claims #67-72 in the amount of \$392,275.48.

(2) Following comments from the floor, Dr. Jarman gave the construction update. Motion: to approve Change Order #5 at the High School on Phase IV in the amount of \$72,017.00.

- (3) Mr. Stockstill introduced Emagene Howell, a custodian at Clark Elementary as Employee of the Month. Mr. Harmon introduced Delores Arrowood, American Literature teacher at the High School as Educator of the Month.
- (4) Motion: to strike paragraph 2 from Policy 4025 Student-Staff Relations.

(5) Motion: to approve Board Policy 4025-Student-Staff Relations as amended.

Approved: 4-1

(6) Motion: to approve a proclamation honoring the nation's teachers and more specifically to honor Union's teachers on March 4, 1986.

Approved: 5-0

(7) Motion: to accept the resignation of Mary Peden, effective immediately and the resignation of Kelly Clarke, effective at the end of the school year.

Approved: 5-0

(8) Motion: to approve Proposal #4 as the school calendar. The discussion that the majority of the teachers did not favor this proposal. The calendar corresponds with the Tulsa and Broken Arrow calendars. School would start on September 2 (after Labor Day) and end on June 3.

- (9) Mr. Coats announced that Clark Elementary had been selected as a finalist in the State Elementary School Recognition program. Mr. Coats announced that he has to leave and would not be present for the Executive Session.
- (10) Motion: to adjourn to Executive Session at 8:00 p.m. to consider personnel matters relating to employment and hiring, appointment, promotion, demotion, disciplining, or resignation of individual salaried public officers, employees, or teachers of Independent School District No. Nine of Tulsa County, Oklahoma with the Board returning to open session to vote.

(12) Motion: to re-hire 455 certified staff members.



our funding short fall. We must all work together in order to continue this quality program.

At this time we are not looking to drop any sport. Our travel and meal allowances will be reduced and in some cases the number of events may have to be reduced. Hopefully, we will not have to reduce the staff size so as to maintain a quality coaching level. Budgets will most certainly be reduced which will cause us to emphasize fund raising at all levels.

The key factor to making ends meet in athletics will be increasing gate receipts through increased attendance at all activities. At this point in time we do not anticipate any major ticket price increases. There will only be a slight increase overall. We are now planning promotions for each of our varsity home games or matches. Since gate receipts are 80% of our budget, it is imperative that we increase the attendance level or our games at all levels.

We are offering our season football ticket holder a discount ticket price for the 1986 season. Any current season ticket holder who renews their tickets before May 1st will save \$5.00 per ticket. This includes reserved seats only. After May 1st season tickets will be \$20.00 each. Our home football schedule will include Broken Arrow and Washington among others. This will be one of the best home schedules in many years.

The elementary physical education teachers are working very hard to produce the 10th Annual Elementary Track Meet. The date is May 13th. The meet this year promises to be the best ever.

As we face these difficult times financially, we can only hope that your continued support will help our kids keep their programs at a level at which we have all become accustomed. Now more than ever before, your attendance at games will be most important. I know, that as in the past you will respond to help our kids.
