

# Past Bond Issue Performance

The District Treasurer consistently monitors how bond funds are spent, and the Board of Education provides oversight and final approval of all bond expenditures on a monthly basis. Most bond project dollars must be spent within three years from the time the bonds are sold. Bond funds can only be allocated for capital expenditures and long-lasting equipment that has been approved by more than 60% of the voters.

Dear Union Friends,



# Frequently Asked Questions

### Q. Why is passage of this bond proposition important to Union?


A. The district's general fund is for salaries, utilities and other recurring operating expenses. It is through the issuance of bonds that Union is able to pay for capital expenditures such as textbooks, instructional technology, equipment and construction. That is why you see those items on bond propositions almost every year. Without bond propositions, the district would have to tap into its general fund to pay for the facilities and instructional tools our children



need, leaving little money to hire teachers or conduct daily operations.

### Q. How will passage of this bond proposition affect my taxes?

A. This is not a tax increase. Because the district pays off existing bonds and its property base continues to grow, that portion of estimated ad valorem tax attributed to Union Public Schools is not expected to increase with passage of the bond proposition.



### O. Why is my vote important?

A. Contrary to most elections in which a simple majority carries issue, state law requires school bond propositions to pass by a 60% super majority. This makes each vote that much more critical. Please remember to cast ballot your February 8!

### Where do I vote?

A. Vote at your regular polling place used in county, state, and national elections. If you are unsure where to vote, please call the Tulsa County Election Board office at 596-5780. Polls are open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Thanks to overwhelming support at the polls last year, land has been purchased north of 51st Street between 129th and 145th East Avenues for Elementary #12, setting the stage for full-day kindergarten districtwide and for addressing elementary student growth in the central and northern portions of the


A successful February 8 bond issue will enable the district to make required improvements to the site, such as removing surface rock in certain sections and building an access road to 145th E. Avenue, as well as completing construction, classroom fixtures and furniture for the new school. The opening is on target for the 2006-2007 school year.

Another major construction project that depends on your using the best features of Union's other elementary schools. vote February 8 is completion of renovation at the 23-year-

old Union Eighth Grade Center, which currently houses nearly 1,100 students, and a separate building for offices, restrooms, dressing rooms and a weight room at the adjoining soccer field used districtwide throughout the year.

The addition of 27,112 square feet, made possible through funds from the 2004 bond issue and the proposed 2005 issue, will net eleven new classrooms, nine new science lal and a mec enter three times as large as the current one. Phase II projects will include much-needed paint, flooring, updated classrooms and the addition of space to the commons area.




