HOUSING IS HEALTHCARE

Legal Aid Oklahoma and Housing Solutions collaborated on medical-legal partnership services to reduce the number of individuals who exit healthcare systems and end up homeless.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

More than 8,000 volunteers gave 62,000 hours of service so others can get ahead in our communities. During the Day of Caring Food and Blood Drive, donors gave 42,000 pounds of food and nearly 200 pints of blood.

INVESTING IN PEOPLE

Because of our 59 partner agencies, 4,546 jobs were supported, \$21.52 was leveraged for every dollar given, and \$224,653,515 was invested in the community through programs and services.

211 Eastern Oklahoma responded to 133,412 inquiries in 2021 and serves 37 eastern Oklahoma counties with more than 1.7 million people. More than 74% of calls come from the Tulsa Area United Way service area.
