The Opportunity: Trainee in Mentorship Program

The Connecticut Audubon Society's Center in Fairfield is seeking enthusiastic, energetic high school students with an interest in Science, Technology, Engineering or Math (STEM) to participate in a program that will engage elementary, high school, and college students in Norwalk (CT) in 8 weeks of age-appropriate STEM education, training, and mentorship to build a robust pipeline of students pursuing secondary education and careers in science and conservation. This program will reinforce STEM programming for elementary school students while providing academic, work, and mentoring experiences and demonstrating career pathways for high school and college students, with a particular focus on underserved students. This program is designed to foster and identify an increased interest in STEM and conservation as a career.

Applicants in this position will participate in a naturalist training to be class assistants for afterschool programs that teach elementary school students science utilizing CAS's award-winning Science In Nature Education program. This position will provide selected applicants the opportunity to gain work experience while learning about careers in conservation/education.

This is a great opportunity for those who love working with children, have a passion for nature and or environmental conservation and are seeking to gain more experience in environmental education.

Primary Responsibilities

- Participate in 12 hours of training on CAS Curriculum at the Fairfield Nature Center from November-March (transportation will be provided)
- Assist with prep and delivery of high quality, safe afterschool education programs to K-5 students including set-up, clean-up and material preparation (March-May).
- Ensure all programs are conducted according to CAS guidelines
- Represent Connecticut Audubon Society in a positive and professional manner
- Other duties as assigned

- Must be enrolled in either 11th or 12th grade of high school
- Have excellent interpersonal skills for working with teachers, administrators, child, staff and professional colleagues.
- Operate with high professional standards
- Use various software programs, including but not limited to Microsoft Word, Excel,
 PowerPoint, Zoom, Google Meets proficiently once trained
- Demonstrate excellent written and verbal skills
- Drive for excellence and achieving goals
- Accept direction in cooperative, flexible manner
- Collaborate with diverse group of individuals and teams
