During the afternoons of May 19 and 20, the Oklahoma City metropolitan area and surrounding counties were struck by tornadoes. Significant damage was done in the areas of Edmond, Shawnee and Carney. Monday afternoon's EF5 tornado carved a path over a mile wide for 17 miles through the towns of Newcastle, Moore and Little Axe.

The next morning, calls came pouring into St. John's Lutheran Church, Moore, where electricity and water were not working, and Internet would not return for several days. By Wednesday

evening, the congregation dedicated themselves to establishing a disaster relief distribution center on their property.

With donations delivered from Iowa, Illinois, as well as all over Oklahoma, the center opened on Saturday, May 25, on the corner of 12th and Santa Fe, one mile north of the path of destruction. The center and its volunteers are coordinated by Karen Karner. On its first day of operation, Karen asked Ann Ward, who lost her apartment, how far into the future she is able to plan right now. "It's 'What do I do in the next hour?" she said. "It's changes constantly."

Lutheran Church Charities dispatched their comfort dogs, golden retrievers whose sole purpose is to provide a way to reduce stress. They provided their services at The Children's Hospital on the Health Sciences Center, St. John's, and the area of Moore.

Pastoral Insights



THE LOVE OF GOD

"Can a person know the love of God and not know Christ?"

God loves even though we may not recognize His love. He sends His rain and His sunshine upon the just and the unjust. Not only because He is a just God, but also because He is a loving God.

God sent His Son, Jesus Christ, into the world in order that we might know Him and His love. Christ was the image of the invisible God, through Whom all things were created and by Whom all were redeemed. In Christ, God offers forgiveness of sin to all people. We have but to receive the offer to make it our own. To receive God's offer in Christ is to come to know God's love. The answer to this question is: If you want to know the fullness of God's love, you must come to know Jesus Christ as your personal Savior.

Picture to yourself a city perishing from thirst. A great reservoir lies on the hilltop above. From the reservoir there runs a main through which the water passes from the reservoir to the city below. This main is opened up, and the dwellers in the city are saved by the water from the reservoir through the pipe which leads down from it. So God's love has reached the world in Christ, His Son. Salvation is from God in Christ through faith. Know Christ, and you will know the love of God.

"But is there a difference between God's love and man's love?"

For one thing, God's love is perfect, man's is imperfect. God is not only loving, He is love itself. The Bible says, "God is Love." The meaning of this statement is that love has not just attached itself to God, it is His very nature.

God's love is altogether unselfish. He loves when no one else would love. The Scriptures tell us, "God shows His love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us." God loves, even though there is no possibility of repayment. God loves even when people do not want His love.

Man's love is never free of a certain amount of selfishness. God's love caused Him to put Himself completely in our place in the person of His Son. We never can put ourselves altogether in the place of someone else, as we would have to do if our actions were to be characterized by perfect love.

Having experienced the love of God through faith in Christ, we can begin to reflect divine love, though in a limited way. To this kind of unselfish love Christ was urging us when He said: "Love one another, as I have loved you." (John 15:12) Christ made a point of the fact that the spirit of love which accompanies faith in Him is the distinguishing mark of Christians in every part of the world: "By this shall all people know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:35)

- Have the approval of district or partner church in which proposed grant recipient is located unless said application is submitted by an LCMS synod board or LCMS World Missions
