# >Final Check: Men, Women, and Talk

Here is a final opportunity for you to strengthen your knowledge of the ten words. First read the following selection carefully. Feminists, sociologists, and psychologists have been taking a long, hard look at—or listening in on—how men and women talk to each other. Their idea is that just as men (1)\_\_\_\_\_ women economically and politically—earning far more and enjoying greater power—men also (2)\_\_\_\_\_ women in conversation.
