> Final Check: Saint Francis of Assisi

Here is a final opportunity for you to strengthen your knowledge of the ten words. First read the following selection carefully. Then fill in each blank with a word from the box at the top of the previous page. (Context clues will help you figure out which word goes in which blank.) Use each word once.

Saints are generally thought of as, well, saintly. It's easy to surmise^o that anyone who became a saint must have been born that way. But this is not true of the man who became known as Saint Francis of Assisi.

Francis was born into a wealthy family in Assisi, Italy, in the year 1182. A convivial°, funloving young man, he was known as the life of the party. He neglected his studies, enjoyed practical jokes, and ran around with a fast crowd. Serving as a soldier at the age of twenty, he was captured and held as a prisoner of war. After he was released, he was seriously ill for many months. When he recovered, Francis had changed. He (1)_ deprecate _(e)d his former frivolous° life and renounced° its meaningless, (2) gratuitous _ pleasures. He began to be more concerned about doing good, and so he decided to rebuild an old church that had been (3)___ raze _(e)d. When Francis's father learned of this, he objected. In turn, Francis gave up any claim to his father's wealth. He sold his property, even gave away his shoes, and began the (4) ascetic life of a barefoot monk. He wandered through Italy, caring for the poor. He spoke with all he met, telling them that money and possessions were tawdry _____, and extolling° the blessings of the spirit. Throughout his travels, he (5) impressed people with his joyous spirit. His (6) <u>blitthe</u> personality attracted many followers, and eventually he founded the Franciscan order of monks and the Poor Clares, an order of nuns. Francis preached to thousands in his lifetime, teaching them to love and care for the poor, but while his talks were (7) ______, they were never dull. He was a natural teacher, preaching even to the birds, whom he called "my little sisters," and reminding them always to praise God. According to legend, Francis was so kind to animals that wild rabbits ran to him for protection.

Francis's faith in God was so strong that he once undertook a(n) (8) <u>arduous</u> forty-day fast on a mountain, where he prayed and meditated. Such acts made him widely known as a man of (9) <u>unimpeachable</u> goodness, simplicity, and love. He died at the age of 45 and was declared a saint by the Catholic Church two years later. After Francis's death the artist Giotto painted a famous picture of the joyful saint preaching to the birds—a tribute more fitting than any spoken (10) <u>eulogy</u> for the modest man who called himself "little brother Francis."
